STATEMENT OF THE BUSINESS TO BE TRANSACTED AT THE MEETING

[The following Explanatory Statement sets out material facts relating to the businesses to be transacted at the 29th Annual General Meeting of Envoy Textiles Limited scheduled for 2 November 2024]

Agenda Item No. 1: To receive, consider and adopt the Audited Financial Statements of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2024 together with the Reports of the Directors and the Auditors thereon;

The Annual Report for 2024 includes the Annual Accounts for the period ending on 30 June 2024, along with the Reports of the Auditors and the report from the Board of Directors.

The Annual Accounts for the financial year 2023-2024 have been prepared and approved by the members of the Board, as well as reviewed by the CEO and CFO of the Company before submission to the Audit Committee. M/S K.M. Hasan & Co., Chartered Accountants, the external auditors of the Company, have issued an unqualified audit opinion with an emphasis on a particular matter, which has been included in the Annual Accounts for the financial year 2023-2024.

As per sections 183 and 184 of the Companies Act, 1994, the directors are required to present the Directors' Report and Annual Audited Financial Statements, including the Auditors' Report, to the Shareholders at the Annual General Meeting.

It is proposed to adopt the Annual Accounts for the financial year 2023-2024, along with the Reports of the Directors and the Auditors.

Agenda Item No. 2: To declare dividend for the year ended 30 June 2024;

The net income attributable to Shareholders amounted to Taka 600.39 million, resulting in an Earnings per Share (EPS) of Taka 3.58 for the Financial Year 2023-2024. In its 236th meeting held on 5 September 2024, the Board of Directors recommended a 20% Cash Dividend, which equals Tk. 2.00 for every share of Tk. 10.00 each, for the year ending on 30 June 2024. This recommendation will be presented to the 29th Annual General Meeting of Shareholders scheduled for 2 November 2024. If approved at the General Meeting, the payment of the final dividend for the year ended on 30 June 2024, as recommended by the Board, will be made on or before 2 December 2024,

following the Annual General Meeting, in accordance with the notification by the Bangladesh Securities & Exchange Commission (BSEC). The dividend will be payable to those members whose names appear in the statement of beneficial owners furnished by Central Depository Bangladesh Limited (CDBL) as of the Record Date on 30 September 2024.

Members are requested to submit their written option to receive the dividend to the Company's Registered/Corporate Office on or before 9 November 2024. Failure to submit such an option within the specified time will result in the dividend being paid as deemed appropriate by the Company.

Agenda Item No. 3: To elect the following Directors in accordance with the provision of Articles of Association of the Company as recommended by the Board:

In accordance with Article No. 125 and 126 of the Articles of Association of Envoy Textiles Limited, Director Mr. Abdus Salam Murshedy; Director Mrs. Rashida Ahmed, and Director Mr. Sk. Bashir Ahmed are set to retire from their positions as directors. However, as they are eligible, they have offered themselves for re-election.

Based on the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee, the members of the Board, in their 236th meeting held on 5 September 2024, proposed to re-elect Director Mr. Abdus Salam Murshedy; Director Mrs. Rashida Ahmed, and Director Mr. Sk. Bashir Ahmed as members of the Company's Board for a period until their retirement by rotation, as stipulated by section 91 of the Companies Act, 1994, and the relevant provisions of the Articles of Association.

Their reappointment is subject to approval by the general shareholders at the 29th Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Agenda Item No. 4: To appoint Auditors of the Company for the term until the completion of 30th Annual General Meeting and fixation of their remuneration; and

conducted the audit of the Company for the fiscal year 2023-2024, completing their second year of audit since their appointment, for a fee of Taka 360,000.00

They are eligible for reappointment at the ensuing 29th AGM until the conclusion of the 30th AGM, in accordance with the provision of BSEC Order No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2006-158/208/Admin/81 dated 20 June 2018 and Regulation 15(3) of the Stock Exchange (Listing) Regulations, 2015.

Upon recommendation of the Audit committee, the Board of the Directors at its 236th meeting held on 5 September 2024 proposed M/S KM Hasan & Co., Chartered Accountants, located at Hometown Apartments (8th & 9th Floor) 87, New Eskaton Road, Dhaka-1000, to be reappointed at a remuneration of Taka 400,000.00.

They will hold office until the conclusion of the 30th Annual General Meeting of the Company and will audit the accounts for the year ending on 30 June 2025.

The appointment of the auditor will be presented for approval by the members at the 29th Annual General Meeting.

ABOUT THE COMPANY

DENIM FABRIC PRODUCTION UNIT

Envoy Textiles Limited, a manufacturer of 100% export-oriented denim fabric, was established in 1995 as a Private Limited Company before being converted to a Public Limited Company in 2009. It is the first denim project in Bangladesh to use rope-dyed technology and is now one of the leading companies in the sector.

The company began commercial operations in 2008 and merged with Edge Denims Limited in 2009, paving the way for a new era of excellence in management, cost control, and streamlined business operations. In June 2012, Envoy Textiles Limited obtained consent from the Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission to raise funds through Initial Public Offerings (IPO) and was listed with DSE and CSE at the end of the same year.

Located in Jamirdia, Bhaluka, Mymensingh, around 71 km north of Dhaka City, the factory occupies approximately 126 Bigha of land registered in the name of the company. The layout plan is designed to create a scenic and eye-catching landscape all around.

SPINNING PLANT (COTTON YARN PRODUCTION UNIT)

Envoy Textiles has implemented backward integration in its denim production process by establishing its own spinning unit within the factory compound. Spanning an area of 320,000 sq. ft., the spinning unit operates with state-of-the-art technology, producing approximately 70-71 MT of yarn per day. Its annual production capacity is set at 25,000 MT.

The primary focus of the spinning unit is to supply yarn for the company's in-house denim fabric production. To ensure the production of high-quality denim fabric, the unit utilizes European machinery known for its excellence.

Commercial operations of the spinning unit commenced at the end of 2016, marking a significant milestone in Envoy Textiles' pursuit of vertical integration and maintaining control over the entire denim manufacturing process.

BLENDED YARN PRODUCTION UNIT

The company has recently established a blended yarn project, which involves producing yarn using a significant proportion of cotton substitute raw materials. In recent decades, there has been a rise in the share of man-made fibers compared to natural fibers.

It is anticipated that the demand for blended yarn will surpass that of cotton yarn in the near future. Blended yarn combines the advantages of polyester with the strengths of cotton fabrics. It not only inherits the desirable qualities of polyester but also retains the beneficial properties of cotton.

The project commenced commercial operation on 1 April 2023, with a capacity of 4,200 MT yarn production per year. The project is equipped with state-of-the-art European and Japanese machinery, and the production facility occupies a floor space of 75,000 square feet within the existing factory premises. Around 60 to 70% of the production will be used internally for denim production, while the remaining portion will be allocated for the deemed export market.

This project is notable for its unique production facilities as it will manufacture various types of special blended yarns for the first time in the industry.

PRODUCTS

Envoy Textiles Limited is a leading denim manufacturing company with a yearly production capacity of 52.00 million yards. The company produces a range of high-quality denim products featuring a wide range of yarns and weaves in various shades of indigo and black. The company specializes in 4.5 oz to 14.75 oz ring and open-end denim and uses stretch, mill wash, and modern finishing processes for products intended for the new-age consumers. These products feature ring-ring constructions in pure indigo and sanforized denim. Envoy Textiles specializes in basic indigo products and plans to move up the value chain to cater to the most refined customers.

Research and Development occupy high importance in the company for product innovation, variations, and color combinations for consumers with exclusive taste. This has contributed to seizing new opportunities, newer markets, and fashionable customers across the globe on an increasing note.

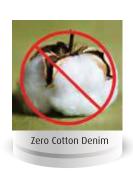


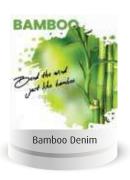

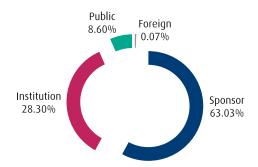

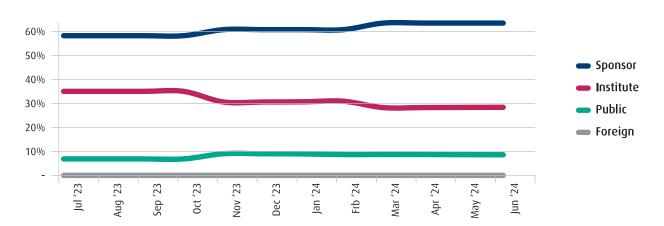

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dear Shareholders,

I am pleased to inform you that Envoy Textiles Ltd. will be hosting its 29th Annual General Meeting (AGM) on 02 November 2024. The Notice of AGM, along with detailed explanatory notes regarding the agenda, is included in this Annual Report and is also available on our official website.

I look forward to your participation at the AGM and the opportunity to welcome you in person.

The recent appointment of Nobel laureate Professor Muhammad Yunus as the head of the interim government has enhanced Bangladesh's global image, especially in the textile and apparel sectors. Despite the country's recent challenges, international fashion brands have maintained their confidence in Bangladesh as a key sourcing hub.

Global brands, particularly from Europe, America, and East Asia, have increased their sourcing volumes from Bangladesh. Exporters, including Envoy Textiles, maintained strong communication with international partners and accelerated production despite political challenges beginning in

mid-July. This ensured that critical export deadlines were met.

During the internet blackout imposed in July, many apparel exporters actively communicated the prevailing situation to buyers, which was instrumental in retaining their confidence and securing additional orders. Major global brands recognized the extraordinary circumstances and did not penalize Bangladeshi exporters for any delays in shipments.

While the industry remains optimistic under Professor Yunus's leadership, challenges persist, such as ongoing protests, electricity and gas shortages, and congestion at ports and airports. If the interim government successfully addresses these issues, Bangladesh's apparel sector is poised to expand its global market share, further establishing its reputation as a reliable manufacturing hub.

At Envoy Textiles Limited, we take immense pride in our role as a leading manufacturer of denim fabrics and remain committed to innovation and sustainability. To this end, we have initiated the



establishment of a Waste Fabric Recycling Plant at our factory premises, aligning with our strategic focus on profitability and social responsibility.

The plant will process local and in-house pre-industrial and post-consumer waste fabrics into recycled fiber. Currently, we source external waste cotton for yarn production along with virgin cotton. Once operational, the plant will enable us to replace external waste cotton with in-house recycled fiber, further enhancing our sustainability efforts.

This initiative addresses the growing demand from our buyers for eco-friendly production practices, providing a competitive edge in export pricing while significantly reducing environmental waste. The plant is expected to process 12 metric tons of waste fabric daily, converting 98% into recycled fiber.

The total capital expenditure for this project is estimated at BDT 237.04 million. The plant is expected to be fully operational by the end of this fiscal year, offering a substantial boost to our production capabilities and enabling us to meet increasing sustainability demands.

Since our commercial operation in 2008 as the first denim facility in Bangladesh to employ Rope Dyed Technology, innovation has been at the core of our operations. Our state-of-the-art spinning plant has further strengthened our backward linkage by producing high-quality yarn, which has been pivotal to our growth. As you know, we expanded the plant to include blended yarn production, incorporating man-made fibers along with cotton.

Our denim products are globally recognized, and we remain committed to delivering superior quality. Despite economic challenges, we are unwavering in maintaining our focus on customer satisfaction, innovation, and sustainability.

Envoy Textiles Limited is poised to lead the industry's transformation towards sustainability and technological advancement. We are not just manufacturing denim; we are driving innovation and exceeding customer expectations in this evolving landscape. Our journey towards a sustainable, quality-driven future is one of continuous progress and commitment.

As we align our business strategies with our commitment to environmental, social, and governance (ESG) principles, we are actively reducing our environmental footprint, ensuring the safety and well-being of our employees, and contributing to the communities we serve.

Business Outlook:

The outlook for Bangladesh's Textile Industry, especially within the denim sector, is promising. The industry is poised for continued growth, driven by its competitive pricing, high-quality output, and advanced production capacity. After overcoming disruptions caused by global events like the COVID-19 pandemic and the Russia-Ukraine war, Bangladesh is steadily regaining its position in the global supply chain.

Bangladesh has emerged as the top supplier of denim to major markets such as Europe and the United States, surpassing China. This dominance is attributed to the country's ability to offer lower costs, better quality, and increased production efficiency. In addition, political instability in Myanmar has led to a shift in global orders toward Bangladesh, further boosting its export potential. Significant local investments, amounting to nearly BDT 25,000 crore in the denim segment, have enabled the development of 42 modern mills capable of producing over 900 million meters of denim fabric annually.

Technological advancements, particularly in water-saving dyeing and washing processes, have also bolstered Bangladesh's competitive edge in the global textile market. These sustainable practices have helped the country maintain its reputation as a leading producer of environmentally friendly garments.

Recent political developments, including the leadership of Nobel Laureate Dr. Muhammad Yunus, have improved Bangladesh's international image and business climate. Dr. Yunus' global standing has fostered renewed confidence in the country's governance and reduced corruption, creating a more favorable environment for business and investment. International brands and retailers remain optimistic about the industry's



future, with many expanding their presence in Bangladesh due to the country's growing production capacity and the stability brought by recent political changes.

There is also anticipation that under the Yunus administration, the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) in the United States, which was suspended in 2013, could be reinstated. This development would further enhance Bangladesh's textile exports to the US. Despite recent political unrest and short-term disruptions to production and exports, such as factory shutdowns and shipment delays, the long-term outlook remains positive. Export orders are beginning to resume, and international buyers are renewing their commitment to sourcing from Bangladesh.

The global denim market is projected to grow at an annual rate of 4.8%, reaching \$76.1 billion by 2026, presenting Bangladesh with a significant opportunity to capture a larger share of this expanding market. Enhanced relationships with international trade bodies, such as the World Bank and IMF, along with Bangladesh's strong environmental credentials in green garment production, will further support the sector's growth.

With long-term political stability, improved governance, and strengthened international partnerships, Bangladesh's textile industry is well-positioned for sustained growth and increased global competitiveness.

Financial Performance

I am pleased to present the financial performance of the company for the fiscal year 2023-24, which has been a year of significant achievement and growth for Envoy Textiles Ltd.

The company reported revenue of BDT 14,261.38 million, reflecting a robust 28.54% increase compared to the previous year. This growth was driven by a surge in global demand for denim fabrics, with volume increasing by 25.12%, bringing total denim sales to 39.75 million yards. Our ability to navigate the challenges posed by the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and geopolitical events such as the Russia-Ukraine war highlights our resilience and adaptability.

We also achieved a 1.49% reduction in the Cost of Goods Sold as a percentage of revenue, primarily due to a favorable decrease in raw material costs,

despite rising gas tariffs, which increased our energy expenses. This improvement led to a Gross Profit of BDT 2,309.97 million, marking a 41.53% increase from the previous year.

However, financial expenses increased by BDT 469.25 million, largely due to rising interest rates on loans from both local and international financial institutions. Despite this, we are proud to report a Net Profit after Tax of BDT 600.39 million, an impressive 83.45% growth from the previous year—our highest profit since the company began operations.

We are also pleased to report a 34.64% increase in Net Asset Value per share, which now stands at Tk. 51.93, primarily attributable to asset revaluation. Earnings per Share (EPS) also improved to Tk. 3.58, up from Tk. 1.95 in 2023.

These results underscore our company's strong financial foundation and commitment to sustainable growth. This performance positions us well to continue enhancing profitability while aligning with our broader strategic and social responsibility objectives.

Our Marketing Initiatives

The fiscal year 2023-24 has presented significant challenges due to the turbulent global environment. Despite these hurdles, we were able to maintain our sales at desired levels through strategic efforts and resilience. The global economic situation created substantial pressure on prices; however, through adaptive strategies, we managed to preserve healthy price realization per yard of fabrics. This prudent approach contributed to one of the strongest profit performances we have seen in recent years.

During the year, our company actively participated in key international exhibitions, helping us stay engaged with global trends and expand our market reach. We showcased our innovations at three major events:

Kingpins New York - July 2023

Premier Vision Milan - November 2023

Kingpins New York - January 2024

Our marketing efforts were multifaceted, driven by the need to meet and exceed sales targets. We engaged with brands and non-brands both locally and internationally through various presentations and interactions. By analyzing market trends and



customer feedback, we introduced new fabric innovations, optimized raw material sourcing to reduce costs, and emphasized value engineering to ensure our products remained competitive. We also took strategic steps to explore new markets and relocated a senior salesperson to the USA to strengthen our presence in that region.

Looking ahead, we foresee continued challenges, such as high inventory levels at retailers, persistent global inflation, the ongoing impact of geopolitical conflicts like the Ukraine-Russia war and tensions in the Middle East, and a reduction in orders from American brands. Moreover, early in 2023, the company faced stiff price competition.

To mitigate these challenges, we have been proactive in exploring alternative markets, including Europe, Australia, Asia, and Africa. We have redefined our customer and product mix to align with shifting market demands. At the same time, we have emphasized improving production efficiency and reducing costs wherever possible. We have also reworked our production lead times to remain competitive and stabilize fabric pricing for our buyers.

These initiatives reflect our unwavering commitment to adaptability and excellence, which have been key to sustaining our success during these uncertain times.

Blended Yarn Manufacturing Plant

Our Blended Yarn Project for the production of cotton-polyester-spandex core-spun yarn, with an annual production capacity of 4,200 metric tons, is running successfully. This initiative allows us to reduce reliance on traditional cotton yarn, especially considering the growing demand for alternative yarn solutions amid challenges such as cotton yarn scarcity and price volatility.

Our facility is equipped with cutting-edge ring spinning technology, utilizing advanced machinery from leading European and Japanese manufacturers.

Approximately 60-70% of our production supports our denim manufacturing operations, while the remaining yarn is allocated for export markets. This strategic distribution allows us to meet both internal requirements and external market demand, positioning the Blended Yarn Project as a key contributor to our sustainability and growth objectives.

Waste Fabric Recycle Plant

We have undertaken the establishment of a Waste Fabric Recycling Plant within our existing factory premises, aligning with our strategic focus on enhancing profitability while fulfilling our social responsibility commitments.

This plant will process both local and in-house pre-industrial and post-consumer waste fabrics into recycled fiber. Currently, our operations involve sourcing waste cotton to produce yarn, in addition to our regular production using imported virgin cotton. Once the plant is commissioned, we will replace external waste cotton with our in-house recycled fiber, strengthening our sustainability practices.

Beyond operational profitability, this initiative directly addresses the growing demands of our buyers for eco-friendly production methods. It will not only position us advantageously in terms of export pricing but also significantly reduce environmental waste. The plant is projected to process 12 MT of waste fabrics daily, converting 98% into recycled fiber.

At present, we hold GRS and RCS certifications for processing 130 MT of recycled cotton per month. Upon project implementation, we anticipate an upgrade in capacity to approximately 350 MT of recycled fiber monthly.

The total capital expenditure for this project is estimated at BDT 237.04 million, with a debt-to-equity ratio of 70:30. The plant is expected to be fully operational by the end of this fiscal year, offering a substantial boost to our production capabilities and enabling us to meet the increasing sustainability requirements set by our buyers.

Association with EPIC

Epic Garments Manufacturing Company Limited (EGMCL), a sister concern of the Hong Kong-based Epic Group, has recently joined our board, appointing Mr. Sunil Daulatram Daryanani as their Nominee Director to represent the company. This move further strengthens the longstanding strategic partnership between Epic and Envoy Textiles.

Both companies share a commitment to quality and high-end fashion, with a shared vision of setting new standards of excellence. This collaboration aims not only to elevate our businesses but also to inspire positive change within Bangladesh's textile and apparel industry.



By working together, we seek to harness our combined synergies, exchange best practices, and explore new business opportunities. Most importantly, our partnership is driven by a mutual ambition to set new benchmarks for Bangladesh's textile sector, fueling an exciting journey of growth and innovation for both companies.

Solar Energy Plant

We have successfully implemented a solar energy plant with a capacity of 2.2 MW, primarily financed under the Bangladesh Bank Refinancing Scheme for Green Projects.

Currently, the project operates at 80% efficiency, with daily operational hours ranging from 4.5 to 5 hours. With an anticipated lifespan of 20 years, the initial electricity cost is calculated at Taka 3.69 per kWh. This cost is expected to decrease over time as the project costs are amortized throughout its operational life.

This initiative not only demonstrates financial viability but also underscores the company's commitment to environmental sustainability by reducing carbon emissions and ensuring compliance with buyer regulations.

Status of Issuance of Preference Shares

In 2019, the company issued 87,000,000 Preference Shares with a face value of Taka 10.00 each at par, totaling Taka 870.00 million, through private placement. The purpose was to attract potential investors for capital investment in BMRE and to settle existing high-cost debt. Out of the total issued shares, 32,000,000 Preference Shares were subscribed for an amount of Taka 320 million. These preference shares are fully redeemable, cumulative, and non-convertible within a 5-year period.

Again in 2022, the Company issued an additional 87,000,000 Preference Shares at a face value of Taka 10.00 each at par, amounting to Taka 870.00 million through private placement. The funds raised were earmarked for financing in the production of blended yarn and to prepay a portion of high-cost borrowing. Similar to the 2019 issuance, these preference shares are fully redeemable, cumulative, and non-convertible within a 5-year timeframe. The principal amount will be redeemed in yearly equal installments, commencing from the end of the first year from the subscription date. Dividends will be paid semi-annually on an arrear basis at a fixed rate.

As of 30 June 2024, the outstanding Preference Shares amount to Taka 586.00 million.

Issuance of Zero-Coupon Bond

In 2022, the Company initiated of financing by issuing a 5-year series Zero Coupon Bond with a face value of BDT 2,000.00 million through private placement. This strategic issuance was expressly earmarked to fund the development of the Captive Power Plant and to proactively prepay a portion of high-cost borrowing.

As of June 30, 2024, the outstanding balance of the Bond remains at BDT 1,004.99 million.

Collaboration with JEANOLOGIA

We entered recently into a Know-how Transfer and Collaboration Agreement with JEANOLOGIA, a Spanish company founded in Valencia in 1994, specializing in sustainable solutions for denim manufacturing with a global presence in over 50 countries. The arrangement involves establishment of an eco-efficient laboratory facility at our factory premises. The objective of this agreement is to collaborate and work together to transform the denim industry, with the ultimate goal of becoming a global leader in innovation and sustainability.



Through this agreement, Envoy Textiles and JEANOLOGIA aim to develop and explore new business models that can help the company tackle the challenges of the industry. The joint efforts will focus on incorporating sustainable practices in the denim manufacturing process, reducing the environmental impact of the industry, and improving the overall efficiency and productivity of the operations.

The establishment of the eco-efficient laboratory facility at our factory premises will provide a platform to exchange knowledge, expertise, and best practices in denim manufacturing. By leveraging the strengths of both companies and by working together, Envoy Textiles and JEANOLOGIA aim to drive positive change in the denim industry and set an example for the rest of the industry to follow.

Envoy Textiles ECO Park

I am pleased to announce that we have recently inaugurated the Envoy Textiles Eco Park, one of our significant green initiatives. This Eco Park stands as a testament to our unwavering commitment to sustainability, environmental stewardship, and the well-being of our employees.

Located within our premises, the 2.5-acre Eco Park is not just a green space; it is a vital part of our strategic efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and promote a balanced ecological footprint. Hong Kong Office Operation

The Hong Kong Representative Office serves as an integral extension of the Dhaka Head Office, facilitating seamless communication between our existing customers and the sales and marketing teams. By ensuring the smooth coordination of business activities, the office plays a key role in maintaining strong relationships with our customers. In addition, it functions as a critical center for collecting the latest industry information and monitoring market trends, providing valuable insights that are shared with the marketing team at the Head Office. This continuous exchange of information allows for the alignment of strategies with current market conditions, supporting the company's efforts to remain competitive and responsive to customer needs.

Update on Legal Proceedings

In continuation of the court matter previously reported, the Hon'ble Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of Bangladesh has resolved the case, directing the company to appoint a Managing Director and Deputy Managing Director through an Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM). Consequently, an EGM notice was issued on 4 January 2024. However, this EGM was postponed due to a restraining Court Order. The Hon'ble Appellate Division further instructed the company to issue a fresh notice for convening the EGM.

In parallel, a writ petition was filed by a shareholder, challenging the consent letter issued by the Ministry of Commerce under section 109 of the Companies Act, 1994, which allowed my role as Managing Director in more than two companies. In response, the Hon'ble High Court Division issued a Rule Nisi and suspended the operation of the consent letter for six months.

In compliance with the Hon'ble Appellate Division's directive, the EGM was held on 2 March 2024, during which shareholders kindly reappointed me as Managing Director. However, Ms. Shehrin Salam Oishee was not elected as Deputy Managing Director.



Further, in compliance with the Hon'ble High Court's order in Company Matter No. 822 of 2023, the company conducted its 28th AGM on 28 March 2024. During this AGM, the following changes to the Board structure were made:

Ms. Shehrin Salam Oishee was not re-elected as Director, and Mr. Sunil Daulatram Daryanani, Nominee of Epic Garments Manufacturing Co. Ltd., was appointed in her place.

I was reappointed as Managing Director for a further term of five years.

Subsequently, I filed a Civil Petition for Leave to Appeal (CPLA 941 of 2024) before the Hon'ble Appellate Division, seeking a stay on the High Court's order in relation to Writ Petition No. 2481 of 2024. The Hon'ble Court granted the stay for eight weeks and directed that the Rule Nisi be disposed of by 30 May 2024, as per the Order dated 20 March 2024.

Following a full hearing, the Hon'ble High Court Division dismissed Writ Petition No. 2481 of 2024 on 19 May 2024. As a result, there are now no restrictions on my position as Managing Director across all my companies.

Our enduring partnerships with our major buyers have been instrumental in driving our growth. Our ability to consistently secure repeat business from numerous international buyers is a testament to their unwavering confidence in our company. It reflects their trust in our capability to stay abreast of the latest trends and consistently deliver high-quality products within the designated timelines.

In the wake of the pandemic, customer behavior has become more price-sensitive. To address this, we have proactively implemented cost-control measures by embracing new technologies, optimizing production flow, and reducing wastage. These measures not only enhance our efficiency but also enable us to offer competitive pricing while maintaining product quality.

Our strategic vision is to capitalize on our existing range of products, expertise, and manufacturing capabilities to diversify our offerings and produce niche, higher-margin products. Leveraging our manufacturing capacity and proficiency, we are confident in our ability to develop and sell such fabrics at competitive prices in international export markets.

Through these initiatives, we aim to not only expand our business but also optimize our product portfolio, diversifying our offerings and gaining access to new markets. This strategic approach will strengthen our position in the industry and foster sustainable growth in the long term.

CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (CSR)

Setup & Maintenance of Pediatric HDU at Burn Unit of Dhaka Medical College Hospital

Envoy Textiles Limited has built a state-of the art-Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (ICU) cum High Dependency Unit (HDU) at Dhaka Medical College Hospital, which is a govt. hospital and generally known as 'Burn Unit of Dhaka Medical'. This facility is the first of its kind in Bangladesh and prior to this there was no ICU/HDU for pediatric burn patients both in Government and Private Hospitals. After building this unit, the Company has also taken the responsibility of maintaining it at their own cost. Which included full cleaning of the premises, laundry of the bed sheet/pillows, etc. and also the maintenance of electrical, mechanical and civil construction.

2. Appointment of People with Disability

The Company is an equal opportunity employer, but in spite of that, it has prioritized the appointment of disable people. Currently 13 disable people are working in different divisions of Factory. Among these, most of the appointments were given proactively by the Company.

Paying Salaries of Deceased Victims of other Companies through BGMEA

The Company has taken the responsibility of the families of 5 deceased victims who died in major fire incidents at a Garment Factory (Tajreen Fashions). Not being directly linked with the company, the Company is continuously paying the last salary of 5 victims. The salary is paid to the nominees of the victims through Bangladesh Garments Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA).

4. Tree Plantation Campaign in Schools

The Company conducts Tree Plantation programs, under which, school students get plants from the company. On 2019, ten thousand plants were distributed to the students of ten schools adjacent to the factory locality. And, in the year 2021, five thousand plants were also distributed among ten schools in the same manner.

5. Bird Nest Installation

The Company installed 400 nest of bird in factory premises to ensure safe bird habitat.

6. Internship for National & International Students

The Company provides Internship opportunity to the students of National and International Universities.

7. Hosting of Study Tours for National & International Students

The Company encourages the visits of students at the factory, and hence, periodic visit of students from different disciplines and organizations are arranged and hosted by Envoy Textiles on regular basis.

8. Awareness Program for Dengu Prevention

The Company has taken a program for Awareness on Dengue Fever, more than 5,000 leaflets were distributed to different levels of people about Dengue Prevention and do's and don'ts.

9. Awareness Program for Fire Prevention

The Company has taken a program for Awareness on

Fire Safety, more than 5,000 leaflets were distributed to different levels of people on Fire Safety Awareness.

10. Awareness Program for Corona Virus

The company has taken a program for awareness on Corona Virus, more than 4000 leaflets were distributed to different levels of people on Corona Virus awareness.

11. Art Competition for Factory Neighborhood Children

Every Year, Envoy Textiles conducts an Art Competition for the children around factory premises. The walls for painting and art props are provided by Envoy Textiles and prizes are also given. Envoy Textiles. also preserves the artwork in their wall at least for a year.

12. Financial Aid for Special Patient at Dhaka Medical (Tree Man Disease)

The Company provides financial aids to special patients. The last case was the person with 'Tree Man Disease'. Mr. Bajandar was admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital with a rare disease called 'Tree Man Disease'. This is so far an untreatable disease and different international organizations are still trying to find a cure. 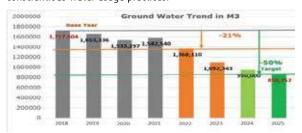

STATEMENT ON CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

Corporate governance is the system by which companies are directed and controlled by management in the best interest of all stakeholders, thereby ensuring greater transparency and better and timely financial reporting.

The Board of Directors is responsible for proper governance, which includes setting out the company's strategic aims, providing the necessary leadership to implement such aims, supervising the management of the business, and reporting to the shareholders on their stewardship.

Envoy Textiles is committed to continually reviewing all corporate governance policies and practices to ensure the ongoing transparency of the company's practices and the delivery of right information to stakeholders. The maintenance of effective corporate governance remains a key priority of the Board of Envoy Textiles Limited.

In its commitment to maintaining high standards of corporate governance, the company also incorporates best governance practices in its activities.

Date of this Corporate Governance Statement

This Corporate Governance Statement reflects the corporate governance and other related policies and practices in place for Envoy Textiles Limited as of 30 June 2024

Board of Directors

Composition

The Board of Envoy Textiles considers that its membership should comprise directors with an appropriate mix of skills, experience, and personal attributes. This allows the directors, individually and the Board collectively, to efficiently and effectively discharge their responsibilities and duties under the law, understand the business of the Company, and assess the performance of the management.

The composition of the Board embraces diversity. The Directors have a range of local and international experience, expertise, and specialized skills that assist with decision-making and leading the company for the benefit of shareholders.

The Board of Envoy Textiles consists of eleven Directors, including three Independent Directors,

who possess a wide range of skills and experience across various professions and businesses. Each Director brings independent judgment and considerable knowledge to effectively perform their roles. The Board of Directors ensures that the activities of the Company are always conducted with strict adherence to the highest possible ethical standards and in the best interests of the stakeholders.

Retirement and Re-election of Directors

According to the Articles of Association of the company, at least one-third of the directors are required to retire every year. The retiring directors shall be those who have served the longest in the office since their last election. In the case of individuals appointed as directors on the same day, their retirement shall be determined by lot, unless they agree otherwise. However, they will remain eligible for re-election.

Independent Directors

The three Independent Directors mentioned below were initially appointed in accordance with the Order of the Hon'ble High Court Division of the Supreme Court of Bangladesh, passed on 9 March 2023, in the Company Matter 202 of 2022. Their appointments were subsequently approved in the 27th Annual General Meeting held on 24 August 2023, following the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee and appointment by the Board for a 3-year term:

1. Mr. Muhammad Shafigur Rahman,

Barrister-at-Law and an Advocate of the Supreme Court of Bangladesh, is the Independent Director of the company. After obtaining an LLB (Hons.) and an LLM from the University of Dhaka, Mr. Shafiqur Rahman went to England to study law at the University of London, where he achieved a second Honours degree in law. He completed his bar vocational course at the University of Northumbria at Newcastle, earning a 'very competent' grade. He became a member of Lincoln's Inn and was called to the bar in 2002. Upon returning to Bangladesh, he joined the Chambers of Dr. M. Zahir, a prominent corporate and constitutional expert in Bangladesh, and remained with him until Dr. Zahir's unfortunate demise in 2013. Mr. Shafigur Rahman enjoyed the benefits of working in Dr. Zahir's prestigious corporate chambers, which included dealing with large multinational corporate clients such as



Chevron, Lafarge, Youngone, Procter and Gamble, British American Tobacco, US Fibres, Haewae, Cathay Pacific, as well as prominent local clients like Berger, MJL Bangladesh Ltd., Grameenphone, Renata, IIDFC, IDLC, ACI, ONE Bank, AB Bank, LankaBangla Finance, Independent University, American International University, HRC Shipping, and others.

While mainly practicing as a litigator in the Supreme Court, Mr. Shafigur Rahman also engages in opinion writing, drafting contracts, and vetting legal documents as part of his daily routine. His main areas of practice include Admiralty, Corporate, Commercial, Securities, Banking, Insurance, Judicial Review (Writ), and Arbitration. He serves as the Legal Retainer of the Dhaka Stock Exchange, providing advice on capital market and securities law. He works for several Protection and Indemnity (P & I) Clubs, including Standard Club Europe, Standard Club Asia, Swedish Club Hong Kong, and Japan P & I Club. He regularly contributes legal articles to the law journal "Bangladesh Legal Times". He is frequently appointed as an "amicus curiae" by the Company Bench of the High Court Division in critical cases to assist the court in arriving at correct judicial decisions.

2. Mr. Fakhruddin Ahmed, FCMA, FCA, is the Independent Director of the Company. Mr. Ahmed, the son of Late Mr. Abdur Rahman, was born in 1963 into a respectable Muslim family in Comilla. His early education began in Comilla, where he attended Comilla Zilla School and Victoria Govt. College. He obtained a B. Com (Hons.) in Accounting and an M. Com (Accounting) from the University of Dhaka in 1983 and 1984, respectively. He is a Certified Chartered Accountant and Auditor, as well as a Certified Cost and Management Accountant and Auditor. He is recognized as a fellow member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Bangladesh (ICAB) and the Institute of Cost & Management Accountants of Bangladesh (ICMAB).

Currently, he serves as the Managing Director of the Newage Group Companies, reputable business conglomerates involved in export-oriented manufacturing of knit fabrics and garment accessories.

Mr. Fakhruddin Ahmed is also engaged as an Adjunct Faculty Member in the Department of Business Studies at the State University of Bangladesh, teaching MBA and EMBA programs. With over 31 years of professional experience in the field of finance and accounts, Mr. Fakhruddin Ahmed possesses the ability to manage complex

projects, excellent organizational skills, and an active professional network of relevant contacts within the local business communities. Throughout his various positions, companies under his leadership have experienced significant expansion and achieved the status of being one of the leading companies in their respective sectors.

3. Mr. Syed Shahed Reza, is an Independent Director of the Company. He is a dynamic personality, holding a Master's degree in Public Administration from Dhaka University, with diverse experience in diplomatic affairs, education, social, cultural, and sports fields. He held a position as a member of the Senate at Dhaka University. Previously, he served as the Ambassador of Bangladesh to Kuwait and the Republic of Yemen and held the position of President of Dhaka Club. He has worked as the National Chancellor for the Bangladesh Chapter of the International Association of Educators for World Peace (IAEWP), affiliated with NGOs such as UN (ECOSOC), UNDP, UNICEF, UNESCO, and UNCEO.

He is also an active sports organizer, currently serving as the Secretary-General of the Bangladesh Olympic Association, in addition to having previously held leadership positions in various prestigious sports organizations. He received the National Award in 2014 for his outstanding performance as a sports organizer.

Mr. Shahed is known for his strong relationships with corporate and political entities at home and abroad.

None of the Independent Directors hold any shares of the Company.

No female Independent Director has been appointed as of the reporting date. The company has the option to appoint one by 3rd of April 2025. The company is now actively seeking a suitable female candidate to comply with the BSEC requirements.

Role and Responsibilities of the Board

The Board is committed to the Company, aiming to achieve superior financial performance and long-term prosperity while meeting stakeholders' expectations of sound corporate governance practices. The Board of Directors has full control over the Company's affairs and is fully accountable to the shareholders.

They firmly believe that the Company's success largely depends on credible corporate governance practices. With this in mind, the Board of Directors sets out its strategic focus and oversees the business and related affairs of the Company. The



Board also formulates strategic objectives and a policy framework for the Company.

Chairman of the Board

The Chairman of the Board is usually elected to the office of Chairman by the directors. The Board considers that the Chairman is independent. The Chairman is a non-executive director.

Role of the Chairman

The Chairman, who is a non-executive director, oversees the Board and serves as the primary link between the Board and management. They work closely with the Managing Director and Company Secretary to set the agenda for Board meetings. The Chairman is responsible for providing leadership to the Board and ensuring its effective functioning in fulfilling its responsibilities as Directors of the Company.

The Chairman of the Board and the Managing Director of the Company are two different individuals. The Chairman is not the Chief Executive of the Company. The roles of Chairman and Managing Director are independent and separate.

Role of the CEO

The CEO holds the responsibility of establishing and executing the Company's operating plan, which is crucial for achieving the Company's objectives. In addition to this, the CEO serves as a coach, working closely with executives to enhance their contributions by improving their efficiency and effectiveness.

Conduct for the Board Members

The Board of Directors of Envoy Textiles is dedicated to upholding the highest standards of conduct in all their interactions with employees, buyers, members, shareholders, regulators, and the public.

Board Meeting

Board Meeting Practices

The Company shall conduct its Board meetings, record accurate minutes of these meetings, and maintain the necessary books and records in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bangladesh Secretarial Standards (BSS) as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Secretaries of Bangladesh (ICSB).

The Board of Directors of the Company convenes meetings on a regular basis at the Company's Registered Office and also utilizes online platforms for simultaneous participation. These meetings occur at least once every quarter and are essential for the Board to fulfill its responsibilities and execute its functions. To ensure efficient coordination, each meeting is scheduled well in advance, and written notices are provided to every director by the Company Secretary.

Number of Board meeting held in the financial year 2023-24

A total of thirteen meetings of the Board were held during the accounting year, and the attendance of directors at those meetings is disclosed in Annexure-IV of the Directors' Report. At least five directors' presence is required to constitute a quorum.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 184 of the Companies Act, 1994, Rule 12 (and the schedule provided therein) of the Securities and Exchange Rules 2020, and the Bangladesh Securities & Exchange Commission Notification No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2006-158/207/Admin/80 dated 03 June 2018 regarding compliance with the Corporate Governance Code 2018, and subsequent amendment thereon dated: 16 October 2023 No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2009-193/66/PRD/148, the Board of Directors takes great pleasure in submitting its Report to the Shareholders for the year ended 30 June 2024, as outlined in the following paragraphs:

- Diversification into man-made fibers alongside cotton garments.

International clothing retailers and brands are increasingly optimistic about denim products made in Bangladesh, thanks to strong business prospects. Many of these companies are either expanding their operations or setting up new offices in the country, driven by the growing responsiveness of local manufacturers.

A significant factor contributing to this positive outlook is the recovery of the global supply chain from the disruptions caused by Covid-19 and the Russia-Ukraine war. Bangladesh has gained an influx of work orders, partly due to political turmoil in Myanmar, which has redirected business to the region.

Local denim producers are also investing in innovative washing and dyeing technologies to reduce water consumption and enhance sustainability in manufacturing processes. This technological advancement, coupled with increased production capacity, is helping Bangladeshi denim makers meet the rising global demand.

As a result, international retailers view Bangladesh as a key player in the denim market. The country has already surpassed China to become the top denim supplier to Europe and the US, largely because other emerging nations like Cambodia lack substantial denim production capabilities.

With global demand for denim products on the rise, businesses are actively seeking to boost their capacity to capture a larger share of the \$64.5 billion global denim market. Projections suggest that the market will grow to \$76.1 billion by 2026, at an annual growth rate of 4.8 percent, underscoring the vast opportunities for growth in this sector.

Bangladesh has emerged as one of the largest producers of denim fabric globally, with an estimated production capacity of around 900 million meters per year, supported by 42 active denim mills. In recent years, the country's denim industry has experienced steady growth, driven by factors such as low labor costs, a large and youthful workforce, favorable government policies, and rising global demand for denim products.

Over the past four decades, Bangladesh's apparel industry has undergone a remarkable transformation, evolving from modest beginnings to becoming a recognized leader in the global fashion market. The "Made in Bangladesh" label is now synonymous with quality and reliability, making Bangladeshi products the preferred choice for many of the world's top brands.

Bangladesh is now the second-largest apparel exporter after China. Major fashion retailers, including Tommy Hilfiger, Gap, Calvin Klein, H&M, Giorgio Armani, Ralph Lauren, and Hugo Boss, rely on Bangladeshi factories for production. In



response, numerous global retailers have established sourcing operations in the country.

This success is the result of several factors, including competitive pricing, accountability of manufacturers, adoption of modern technologies, and a commitment to meeting environmental and workplace safety standards. These aspects have resonated with global fashion leaders, reinforcing Bangladesh's reputation as a trusted manufacturing hub.

The apparel sector plays a vital role in Bangladesh's economy, accounting for 82% of manufactured exports and providing employment to over 4.2 million people. As Bangladesh transitions from a least-developed country to a middle-income nation by 2026, the strength of its apparel industry remains crucial.

The country's least-developed status has granted it trade privileges such as duty-free market access to numerous countries, enhancing its global competitiveness. Currently, Bangladesh enjoys market access to approximately 52 countries worldwide.

Bangladeshi manufacturers and exporters have developed robust vertical capacities, ensuring transparency and seamless coordination within supply chains, a feature previously associated mainly with China. Advanced production and management techniques have been adopted to cater to the global market, resulting in high-quality products and strict adherence to technical and safety standards.

However, this success did not come without challenges. The industry has faced obstacles related to rules of origin, most-favored-nation status, and external shocks such as global financial crises and factory accidents. Yet, through resilience and adaptability, the industry has continued to grow, supported by the trust and collaboration of global brands, retailers, and fashion consumers. The global economic landscape, rising inflation, and a strong US dollar have contributed to additional pressures on import costs, impacting Bangladesh's reserves and increasing inflation. Nonetheless, the US market remains a key destination for Bangladeshi apparel exports, offering better opportunities compared to other countries.

Bangladesh's textile industry predominantly produces cotton-based garments, with over 70% of

export shipments consisting of cotton items. In response to rising demand for alternative materials, some manufacturers are gradually diversifying into man-made fibers like viscose. Despite the global economic slowdown and inflationary pressures in Bangladesh, the demand for yarn has softened, affecting the broader textile industry. Yet, Bangladesh's apparel sector continues to evolve, adapting to global trends and maintaining its position as a leader in the global fashion market.

THE STATE OF THE COMPANY'S AFFAIRS

- 100% export-oriented LEED Platinum denim fabric manufacturer with Rope Dyed Technology, commenced commercial operation in 2008
- Installed production capacity of 52 million yards of denim fabrics per annum
- State-of-the-art Spinning Plant with a capacity of 25,000 MT of cotton yarn per year, commenced operations in 2016
- Blended yarn production plant, started commercial operation in 2023, with a capacity of 4,200 MT of yarn per year, using a significant proportion of cotton substitute raw materials.

Envoy Textiles Limited is a 100% export-oriented denim fabric manufacturer and the first denim project in Bangladesh to employ Rope Dyed Technology. The company currently has an installed production capacity of 52 million yards of denim fabrics per annum.

A remarkable milestone for the company is its achievement of the LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Platinum score. This notable distinction sets Envoy Textiles apart as the first textile manufacturer in Bangladesh and the world's first denim manufacturer to reach such an environmental standard. The LEED Platinum score reflects the company's unwavering commitment to ensuring a workplace that prioritizes maximum environmental safety.

Since its commercial operation in 2008, the company has experienced significant growth. It began its commercial operations with an initial production capacity of 16 million yards per annum. However, through strategic expansion efforts, Envoy Textiles has effectively multiplied its capacity by more than threefold.



Presently, the company's attainable optimum running capacity stands at approximately 50 million yards of fabrics per annum. Its product offerings span a wide range of denim fabrics, catering to different recipe variations, colors, and shades, ranging from 4.5 oz to 14.75 oz. Envoy Textiles prides itself on its dedication to product development, constantly leveraging research and innovation to meet the needs of the upper market segment.

In addition to its denim manufacturing capabilities, Envoy Textiles operates its own state-of-the-art Spinning Plant for the production of Cotton Yarn. This plant, located within the same compound as the Denim Factory in Bhaluka, Mymensingh, boasts a production capacity of 25,000 MT of yarn per year. Since its commercial operation commenced towards the end of 2016, the Spinning Plant has effectively utilized its installed capacity. The

majority of the yarn produced is consumed in-house, demonstrating the company's vertical integration and self-sufficiency.

The company has recently established a blended yarn project, which involves producing yarn using a significant proportion of cotton substitute raw materials. In recent decades, there has been a rise in the share of man-made fibers compared to natural fibers.

The project commenced commercial operation on 1 April 2023, with a capacity of 4,200 MT yarn production per year. The project is equipped with state-of-the-art European and Japanese machinery, and the production facility occupies a floor space of 75,000 square feet within the existing factory premises. Approximately 60 to 70% of the production is utilized internally for denim production, with the remaining portion allocated to the deemed export market.

RISKS AND CONCERNS

The growth of the Bangladesh Denim Industry, being an export-oriented sub-sector, is heavily reliant on the economic stability of importing countries. However, several factors pose significant risks to the industry's survival and competitiveness. These include the possibility of an economic recession, volatile cotton prices in the international market, infrastructural bottlenecks, strict government policies on textile exports, and political unrest, all of which expose the industry to systematic risks. The ongoing gas crisis and frequent energy price hikes further exacerbate the challenges faced by the industry,

making it difficult to remain competitive.

Besides, the turmoil in the Red Sea has resulted in a significant rise in sea freight costs, rendering business operations more expensive for local manufacturers. Moreover, the global demand for denim products has experienced a notable decline owing to the economic recession. These factors exacerbate the industry's challenges.

To address these risks and concerns, the company is proactive in implementing systematic controls. One significant market risk is the competition faced from established manufacturers in countries such as China, India, Pakistan, Cambodia, and Vietnam. India and Pakistan, in particular, have become



attractive to international buyers due to their devalued local currencies against the US dollar and cost advantages resulting from their cotton production. Moreover, Pakistan enjoys a GSP facility in the EU market. As the cost of manufacturing in China rises, buyers are increasingly considering more cost-efficient alternatives like Bangladesh.

However, the Bangladesh Denim Textile Industry has a competitive advantage. With a well-developed garment infrastructure and a continuous focus on upgrading the skills of human resources, the industry is capable of producing high-quality and cost-competitive products.

Demand risk is another concern, as the expected growth in demand for denim products is not being met. The younger generation's preference for electronic gadgets over fashionable denim wear, as well as seasonal variations in demand due to climate changes, have contributed to this situation. Financial risk exists, and the company acknowledges the uncertainties associated with the use of estimates in the preparation of financial statements, as disclosed in the Financial Statements.

The volatility of cotton prices in the world market presents a raw material price risk. To mitigate this risk, the company procures cotton during the harvesting period, ensuring sufficient stock to cover price fluctuations throughout the year.

Foreign exchange risk is minimal, as payment for raw materials is set-off by export proceeds in the same foreign currency. Any fluctuations in foreign exchange rates are adjusted through natural hedges.

OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE

The Company operates in the production of denim fabrics and yarns, offering a wide range of options including diverse recipes, colors, weights, and fashion variations. This product line represents the entirety of our business.

Our revenue is derived from multiple sources. The core revenue stream is generated through deemed exports, achieved by supplying export-oriented local Ready-Made Garments (RMG) against back-to-back Letters of Credit (LC). Also, we directly export fabrics to over 15 countries, which constitutes approximately 10-20% of our total production.

Furthermore, a portion of our revenue comes from various sources. We receive cash incentives from the government as a reward for our export activities. This provides an additional boost to our earnings. There is insignificant revenue generated from the sale of sample fabrics, wastage, or stock fabric sales. We also engage in exporting dyed yarn through export-oriented local knit RMG, contributing to our overall revenue.

As an export-oriented company, we recognize any gains or losses resulting from foreign exchange fluctuations in a separate category within our revenue. This allows us to account for the impact of currency fluctuations on our financials accurately.

In terms of our yarn production, approximately 25-30% of the varn manufactured at our Spinning Unit is exported to local export-oriented denim fabric manufacturers. This enables us to diversify our revenue streams and cater to the specific needs of these manufacturers.

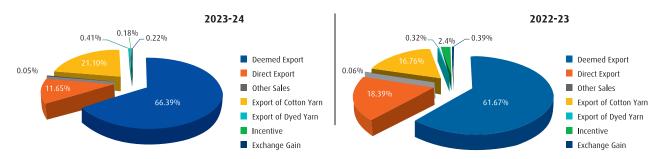

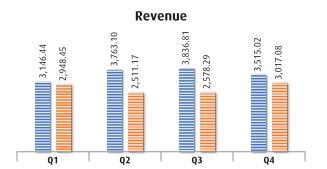


Revenue Segment in Graph



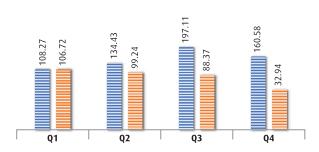

Quarter-to-Quarter Results Comparison for FY 2023-2024 vs. FY 2022-2023

We are pleased to present a comprehensive analysis of the company's quarter-to-quarter financial performance for the fiscal years 2023-2024 and 2022-2023. This report covers key financial indicators, including revenue, gross profit, net profit, and net profit margin ratios, while offering context on the factors influencing these results.



Profit

1st Quarter Results:

Revenue: BDT 3,146.44 million (2023-2024) vs. BDT 2,948.45 million (2022-2023)

Revenue Growth: 6.72% YoY

The slight increase in revenue can be attributed primarily to the rise in the exchange rate, which positively impacted on export revenues. Despite this, the growth was moderated by persistent challenges in the global supply chain and higher input costs.



Gross Profit: BDT 450.59 million (2023-2024) vs. BDT 455.39 million (2022-2023)

Gross Profit Decline: (1.05) % YoY

Gross profit experienced a minor decline due to increased operational costs, such as higher gas tariffs and rising bank interest rates, which compressed margins. Although sales increased, these costs mitigated profit expansion.

Net Profit: BDT 108.27 million (2023-2024) vs. BDT 106.72 million (2022-2023)

Net Profit Growth: 1.45% YoY

Net profit saw a slight increase, but the NP margin decreased to 3.44% from 3.62% due to higher operating expenses. We faced significant hikes in gas tariffs and interest rates, contributing to pressure on the bottom line.

2nd Ouarter Results:

Revenue: BDT 3,763.10 million (2023-2024) vs.

BDT 2,511.17 million (2022-2023) Revenue Growth: 49.85% YoY

The second quarter witnessed a robust recovery in our key markets, particularly the USA and Europe, after a pandemic-induced slowdown. Both regions demonstrated strong demand, helping drive substantial revenue growth.

Gross Profit: BDT 487.38 million (2023-2024) vs. BDT 378.16 million (2022-2023)

Gross Profit Growth: 28.88% YoY

While revenue surged, operating costs (gas tariffs, bank interest rates) remained high, limiting the growth in gross profit. However, we managed to maintain healthy margins through cost-control initiatives.

Net Profit: BDT 134.43 million (2023-2024) vs. BDT 99.24 million (2022-2023)

Net Profit Growth: 35.46% YoY

Despite cost challenges, net profit increased, reflecting the market recovery and operational resilience. NP margin was slightly reduced to 3.57%, primarily due to the higher operational costs mentioned earlier.

3rd Quarter Results:

Revenue: BDT 3,836.81 million (2023-2024) vs.

BDT 2,578.29 million (2022-2023)

Revenue Growth: 48.81% YoY

Strong international demand, coupled with a higher exchange rate, drove a significant jump in revenue during Q3. However, foreign exchange losses were experienced in 2023, which partially offset the revenue gains.

Gross Profit: BDT 668.21 million (2023-2024) vs.

BDT 467.43 million (2022-2023) Gross Profit Growth: 42.95% YoY

Gross profit saw substantial improvement, benefiting from increased revenue, although foreign exchange fluctuation losses in 2023 had a dampening effect on profit growth. Nonetheless, cost control efforts allowed us to maintain a positive trajectory.

Net Profit: BDT 197.11 million (2023-2024) vs. BDT 88.37 million (2022-2023)

Net Profit Growth: 123.05% YoY

The net profit more than doubled compared to the previous year, reflecting a successful quarter despite external challenges. The concessional tax policy positively impacted Q3 in 2024, contributing to a stronger bottom line.

4th Quarter Results:

Revenue: BDT 3,515.02 million (2023-2024) vs. BDT 3,017.08 million (2022-2023)

Revenue Growth: 16.50% YoY

Revenue growth moderated in Q4 as demand stabilized in key markets. However, the company continued to benefit from the favorable exchange rate environment and improved supply chain dynamics.

Gross Profit: BDT 703.79 million (2023-2024) vs.

BDT 331.17 million (2022-2023) Gross Profit Growth: 112.52% YoY

The significant improvement in gross profit is a direct result of increased revenues, stable costs, and the realization of other income from unrealized foreign exchange fluctuations. This quarter represents our highest gross profit margin.

Net Profit: BDT 160.58 million (2023-2024) vs. BDT 32.94 million (2022-2023)

Net Profit Growth: 387.49% YoY

Net profit experienced exceptional growth in Q4, supported by concessional tax benefits and an unrealized foreign exchange gain, which significantly boosted overall profitability. The NP margin reached 4.57%, up from 1.09% in the previous year.



Key Takeaways:

Revenue Growth: The company experienced strong revenue growth throughout FY 2023-2024, driven by market recovery in key export regions, particularly in the USA and Europe, and favorable exchange rate movements.

Operating Challenges: Higher operational costs, particularly from gas tariffs and rising interest rates, impacted profitability in the earlier quarters. These costs have been effectively managed in the later part of the year through operational efficiencies.

Net Profit Resilience: Despite higher costs, the company's net profit grew significantly, especially in Q3 and Q4, due to favorable tax policies and exchange rate gains.

Profit Margin Trends: The company saw an overall improvement in profit margins, particularly in Q4, which was boosted by tax and foreign exchange benefits.

FY 2023-2024 was a year of robust growth despite challenges. Our strategic focus on operational efficiency, market responsiveness, and prudent financial management helped us achieve significant financial gains. We remain optimistic about future performance, as we continue to focus on enhancing profitability while navigating external challenges.

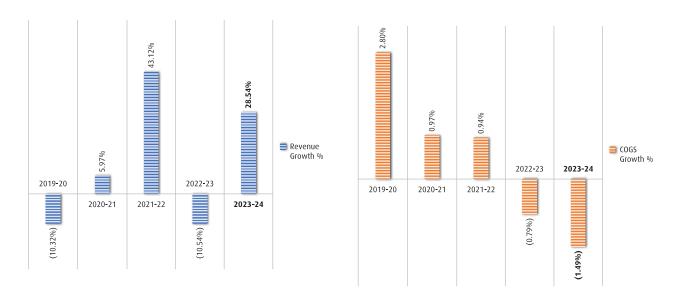

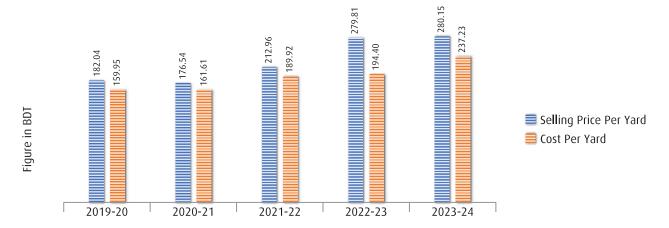

Significant Events Relating to Financial Operating Results

A comprehensive overview of our financial performance for the fiscal year 2023-24, compared to 2022-23, is presented below for your record. Despite global uncertainties, we have achieved a remarkable year of growth and operational excellence, positioning ourselves strongly in the market.

Revenue Growth and Demand Surge

The company posted revenue of BDT 14,261.38 million, reflecting a 28.54% increase from BDT 11,094.99 million in the previous year. This exceptional growth was driven by a significant surge in demand for denim fabrics in international markets. We sold 39.75 million yards of denim fabric in 2024, an increase of 25.12% compared to 31.77 million yards in 2023. This growth reflects our ability to capitalize on new market opportunities while maintaining strong relationships with existing customers. Despite the persistent impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and geopolitical disruptions, such as the Russia-Ukraine war and the Red Sea conflict, we remained resilient and adaptable, enabling us to secure this growth trajectory.

Improved Cost Efficiency and Profitability

Our cost management strategies bore fruit during the year, as evidenced by a 1.49% reduction in the Cost of Goods Sold (COGS) as a percentage of revenue. The COGS stood at BDT 11,951.41 million, compared to BDT 9,462.84 million in 2023. This improvement was primarily due to the reduction in raw material costs achieved despite a sharp rise in energy costs resulting from increased gas tariffs. The ability to control input costs in a challenging environment has resulted in a Gross Profit of BDT 2,309.97 million, a significant 41.53% increase

from the previous year's BDT 1,632.15 million.

Financial Expenses and Other Income

While we experienced positive operational performance, financial expenses rose by BDT 469.25 million, reaching BDT 1,232.51 million, primarily due to the increase in interest rates on loans from both local and international banks. This increase represents a 1.76% rise as a percentage of revenue. We have carefully managed our debt portfolio to mitigate the impact of rising interest costs, but this remains a key focus area going forward.

On the other hand, we recorded Other Income of BDT 48.15 million, which includes an unrealized gain from foreign exchange fluctuations, providing additional support to our bottom line.

Net Profit Before and After Tax

Our focus on cost optimization, coupled with strong revenue growth, led to a Net Profit before Tax of BDT 716.18 million, reflecting a 38.47% increase compared to BDT 517.22 million in 2023. Furthermore, due to a 50% concessional source tax benefit, our tax expense decreased significantly to BDT 115.79 million, a 39.04% reduction from BDT 189.94 million in 2023. As a result, we achieved a Net Profit after Tax of BDT 600.39 million, representing an 83.45% growth year-on-year—the highest profit since our listing on the stock market in 2012.

Earnings Per Share (EPS) and Asset Valuation

This strong financial performance translated into an Earnings Per Share (EPS) of Tk. 3.58, up from Tk. 1.95 in the previous year. Also, the Net Asset Value (NAV) per share increased by 34.64% to Tk. 51.93, primarily due to the revaluation of assets, reflecting the company's enhanced financial standing and asset management strategy.



Capacity Utilization and Operational Efficiency

Our capacity utilization improved to 74.61%, up from 64.05% in 2023, representing a 16.49% increase. This improvement reflects the enhanced efficiency of our production processes and the company's focus on optimizing its operational capacity to meet growing market demands.

Net Operating Cash Flow (NOCF)

The Net Operating Cash Flow per share declined to Tk. 3.68 from Tk. 6.99 in 2023. This reduction is primarily due to the increase in revenue during the reporting period. It is essential to clarify that this decrease is not a result of poor receivable recovery or extended credit terms to our buyers. Our receivable recovery process remains consistent and in line with the usual cycle. While we successfully realized a portion of the previous year's receivables, the amount was lower than the receivables generated during the year, which led to the decline in NOCF.

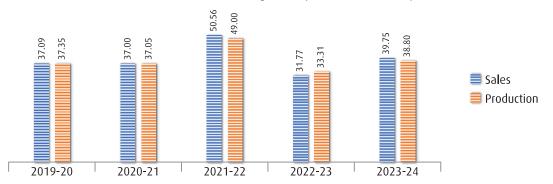
FY 2023-24 has been a year of strong financial and operational performance for Envoy Textiles Ltd. Our ability to grow revenue while maintaining cost efficiency and enhancing profitability underscores the strength of our business model and management's focus on sustainable growth. We are confident that the steps we have taken to improve operational efficiency, coupled with our strategic investments, will enable us to further enhance shareholder value in the coming years.

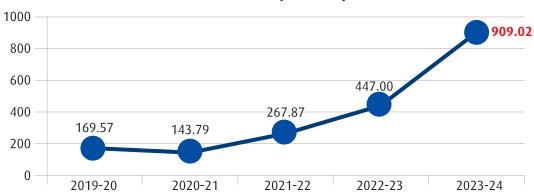

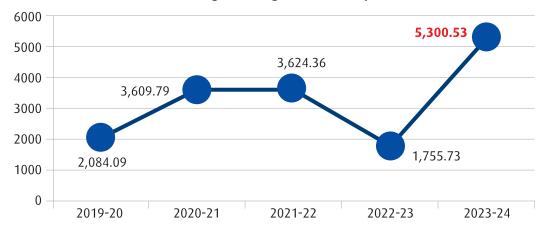

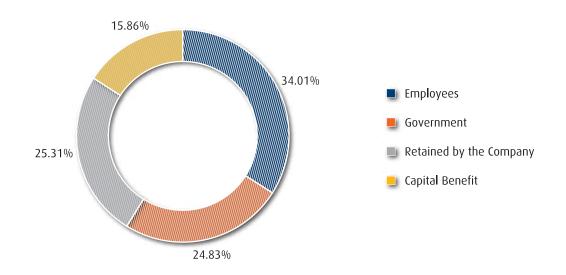

STATUS OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE COMPLIANCE

The status of compliance with the conditions imposed by the Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission's Notification No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2006-158/207/Admin/80 dated 3 June 2018, and amendments thereon dated 16 October 2023 is enclosed as 'Annexure VII, VIII & IX'.

GOING CONCERN

The Directors, after conducting necessary inquiries, are confident that no significant uncertainties that raise doubts about the Company's ability to continue as a going concern have been identified. They reasonably expect that the Company possesses sufficient financial resources to sustain its operations for the foreseeable future. Hence, these financial statements have been prepared based on the going concern assumption.

UTILIZATION OF PROCEEDS FROM PUBLIC ISSUES

The Company conducted its Initial Public Offering (IPO) in 2012. The funds raised from the public offerings have been completely utilized and duly reported.

FINANCIAL RESULTS AFTER PUBLIC ISSUE OF SHARES

The Company initiated its public offering of shares in 2012. Over the reporting financial years, the revenue has exhibited a gradual increase since the public issue. However, the profitability has declined in the past three years due to factors such as high-power costs, rising raw material expenses, and the adverse impact of low demand caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Nevertheless, the Company has successfully managed to rebound and overcome the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic in the year 2021-22

Apparel demand in the US and EU has indeed experienced a significant decrease over the past year, largely attributed to the economic slowdown resulting from the ongoing Russia-Ukraine conflict. This decline has been further compounded by other factors, such as elevated interest rates and inflation, significantly influencing consumer behavior. As a result, the net profit for the year 2023-24 has been impacted by these factors.

Revenue surged significantly in the fiscal year 2023-24, driven by strong demand from major buyers in Europe and the USA. As a result, net profit saw an impressive increase of 83.45% compared to the previous year, marking the highest profit since our stock market listing in 2012.

MINORITY INTEREST

The Company ensures the protection of minority shareholders' interests by preventing any abusive actions undertaken by controlling shareholders, whether directly or indirectly. Additionally, effective mechanisms for redress are in place to address any concerns or grievances.

During the year 2023-24, the Board did not make any decisions that could potentially harm the interests of minority shareholders.

STATUS OF ISSUANCE OF PREFERENCE SHARES

In 2019, the company issued 87,000,000 Preference Shares with a face value of Taka 10.00 each at par, totaling Taka 870.00 million, through private placement. The purpose was to attract potential investors for capital investment in BMRE and to settle existing high-cost debt. Out of the total issued shares, 32,000,000 Preference Shares were subscribed for an amount of Taka 320 million.

These preference shares are fully redeemable, cumulative, and non-convertible within a 5-year period.

Again in 2022, the Company issued an additional 87,000,000 Preference Shares at a face value of Taka 10.00 each at par, amounting to Taka 870.00 million through private placement. The funds raised were earmarked for financing in the production of blended yarn and to prepay a portion



of high-cost borrowing. Similar to the 2019 issuance, these preference shares are fully redeemable, cumulative, and non-convertible within a 5-year timeframe. The principal amount will be redeemed in yearly equal installments, commencing from the end of the first year from the subscription date. Dividends will be paid semi-annually on an arrear basis at a fixed rate.

As of June 30, 2024, the outstanding Preference Shares amount to BDT 586.00 million.

ISSUANCE OF ZERO-COUPON BOND

In 2022, the Company initiated of financing by issuing a 5-year series Zero Coupon Bond with a face value of BDT 2,000.00 million through private placement. This strategic issuance was expressly earmarked to fund the development of the Captive Power Plant and to proactively prepay a portion of high-cost borrowing.

As of June 30, 2024, the outstanding balance of the Bond remains at BDT 1,004.99 million.

ASSET REVALUATION

At its 234th meeting, held on 26 June 2024, the Board of Directors of the Company accepted an Asset Revaluation Report submitted by Asian Surveyors Ltd., a professional valuer, in accordance with their appointment at the 233rd Board meeting on 28 May 2024. The revaluation was conducted based on a cut-off date of 10 June 2024.

The scope of this revaluation was limited exclusively to the Company's land properties, with no changes made to other asset classes. Following the revaluation, the value of land properties increased by BDT 1,895,162,303.00

Subsequently, the valuation was approved by the company's external auditors, and this appreciation in the Company's assets has been duly reflected in the audited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2024.

MANAGEMENT APPRECIATION

The Board of Directors expresses its deep appreciation for the outstanding performance of the management, officers, staff, and workers.

Despite the challenges posed by natural and unnatural factors affecting production and marketing both locally and globally, their unwavering efforts have resulted in increased productivity and net profit. The Board expects the employees and management to continue their pursuit of improvement, keeping the shareholders' interests in mind. The trust shown by shareholders in the management has always been a great source of inspiration for the Board of Directors.

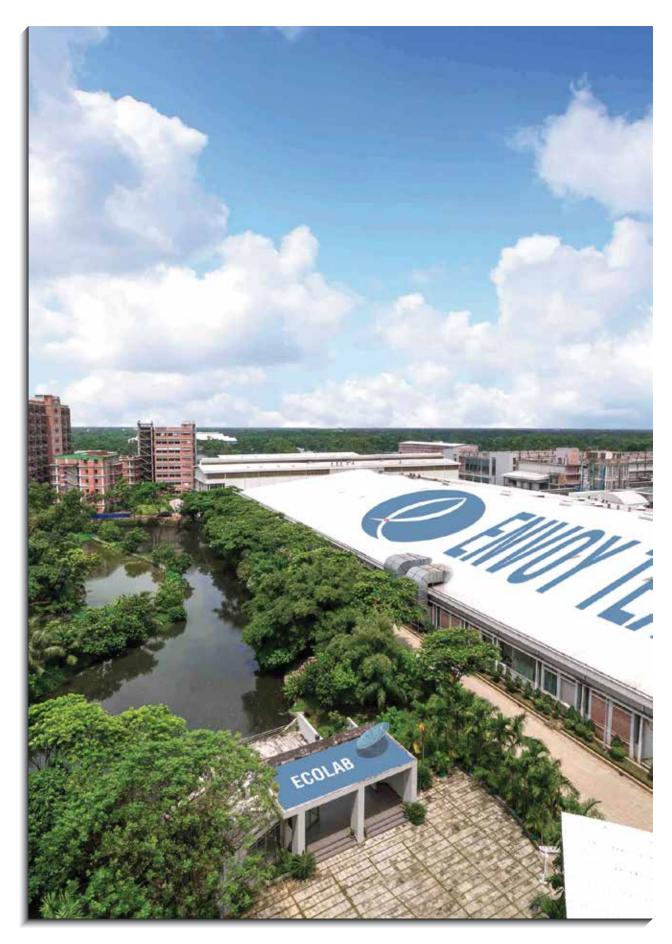

বাংলাদেশের ডেনিম উৎপাদনকারীরা টেকসই উৎপাদন নিশ্চিত করতে নতুন প্রযুক্তি ব্যবহার করছে। ফলে ইউরোপ ও মার্কিন যুক্তরাষ্ট্রের বাজারে বাংলাদেশ এখন শীর্ষ ডেনিম সরবরাহকারী দেশ চীনকে ছাড়িয়ে গেছে। বর্তমানে বাংলাদেশে ৪২টি ডেনিম মিল রয়েছে, যার মাধ্যমে বছরে প্রায় ৯০০ মিলিয়ন মিটার কাপড় তৈরি হয়।

বিশ্বব্যাপী ডেনিম বাজার ২০২৬ সালের মধ্যে প্রায় ৭৬ বিলিয়ন ডলারে পৌছবে বলে আশা করা যায়। এর সাথে তাল মিলিয়ে বাংলাদেশের ডেনিম শিল্পের দ্রুত বিকাশ হচ্ছে। অপেক্ষাকৃত সাম্রায়ী উৎপাদনখরচ, সরকারী সহায়তা এবং বিশ্বব্যাপী চাহিদার কারনে এই খাত এগিয়ে যাচ্ছে।

বাংলাদেশ এখন চীনের পরে দ্বিতীয় বৃহত্তম পোষাক রপ্তানিকারক। বাংলাদেশের অর্থনীতিতে, রপ্তানির ৮২ শতাংশ সামগ্রিক পোষাক শিল্প থেকে আসে এবং প্রায় ৪.২ মিলিয়ন লোকের কর্মসংস্থানের সৃষ্টি করেছে।

বাংলাদেশ স্বল্পোন্নত দেশ হওয়ায় বিশ্বব্যাপি প্রায় ৫২টি দেশে বাংলাদেশের পোষাক পণ্যের শুল্কমুক্ত প্রবেশাধিকার রয়েছে। বাংলাদেশে ডেনিম উৎপাদনকারীদের একটি শক্তিশালী ব্যাকওয়ার্ড ও ফরোয়ার্ড লিংকেজ রয়েছে। উন্নত প্রযুক্তি ব্যবহারের মাধ্যমে উঁচুমানের পণ্য উৎপাদন করে বাংলাদেশ বিশ্ববাজারে নিজেদেরকে টিকিয়ে রেখেছে। পণ্যের বৈচিত্রতা আনতে এবং কটনের নির্ভরতা কমাতে দেশীয় উৎপাদকরা সাম্প্রতিক সময়ে কাঁচামালের বিকল্প হিসেবে কটনের পাশাপাশি কটন-বিকল্প কাঁচামাল দিয়েও ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদন শুক্ত করেছে।

কোম্পানীর বিষয়াদির অবস্থা

এনভয় টেক্সটাইল্স লিমিটেড বার্ষিক ৫২ মিলিয়ন গজ উৎপাদন ক্ষমতাসম্পন্ন বাংলাদেশে স্থাপিত প্রথম রোপ ডাইয়িং প্রযুক্তির শতভাগ রপ্তানীমূখী ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদনকারী একটি প্রতিষ্ঠান। কোম্পানী ২০০৮ সালে বার্ষিক ১৬ মিলিয়ন গজ ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদন ক্ষমতা নিয়ে বানিজ্যিক উৎপাদন শুরু করে এবং এযাবৎ সময়ে এ উৎপাদন ক্ষমতা তিনগুনে উন্নীত হয়েছে। এনভয় টেক্সটাইল্স লিমিটেড লীড প্লাটিনাম সার্টিফাইডধারী একটি প্রতিষ্ঠান। এ অর্জন বাংলাদেশের টেক্সটাইল্স উৎপাদনকারী প্রতিষ্ঠানের এবং বিশ্বের ডেনিম উৎপাদনকারী প্রতিষ্ঠানের মধ্যে সর্বপ্রথম, যা কোম্পানীর সর্বোচ্চ পরিবেশগত নিরাপত্তার নিশ্চয়তা বিধান করে।

৪.৫ আউস থেকে ১৪.৭৫ আউসের বিভিন্ন প্রকারের ফেব্রিক্স বর্তমানে উৎপাদন করা সম্ভব, যার পরিমাণ সর্বোচ্চ বাৎসরিক প্রায় ৫০ মিলিয়ন গজ। গবেষনা ও উৎকর্ষ সাধনের মাধ্যমে ফেব্রিক্সের গুনগত মান ও বৈচিত্রতা সৃষ্টি করে উন্নত বাজার দখল করাই কোম্পানীর অন্যতম লক্ষ্য।

কারখানা প্রাঙ্গণের অভ্যন্তরে বাৎসরিক ২৫ হাজার মেট্রিক টন সূতা উৎপাদনের সক্ষমতায় কোম্পানীর একটি নিজস্ব স্পিনিং মিল আছে।

২০১৬ সাল থেকে এই কারখানা হতে বানিজ্যিকভাবে সূতা উৎপাদন শুরু হয় এবং বর্তমানে দৈনিক উৎপাদন শ্বমতার শতভাগ পরিমান সূতা উৎপাদিত হচ্ছে, যার সিংহভাগই মানসম্মত কোম্পানীর নিজস্ব ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদনে ব্যবহৃত হয়। কোম্পানী ২০২৩ সালে একটি ব্ল্যান্ডেড ইয়ার্ন উৎপাদন মিল চালু করেছে। যেখানে কটনের পাশাপাশি কটন-বিকল্প কাঁচামালের সংমিশ্রনে ইয়ার্ন উৎপাদিত হচ্ছে। এ মিল থেকে বছরে প্রায় ৪,২০০ মেট্রিক টন ইয়ার্ন উৎপাদন হয়ে থাকে। এ কারখানাটি অত্যাধুনিক ইউরোপিয় এবং জাপানী যন্ত্রপাতি দিয়ে সজ্জিত, বিদ্যমান কারখানার প্রাঙ্গণে অবস্থিত। এ কারখানা থেকে উৎপাদিত ইয়ার্নের প্রায় ৭০ শতাংশ নিজস্ব ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদনে ব্যবহৃত হচ্ছে এবং অবশিষ্টটুকু সরাসরি বা প্রচ্ছন্নভাবে রপ্তানি হচ্ছে।

বুঁকি ও এর অবস্থান

বাংলাদেশের ডেনিম শিল্প যেহেতু রপ্তানীমূখী একটি শিল্প, যার সাফল্য বহুলাংশে আমদানীকারক দেশ সমূহের অর্থনৈতিক স্থিতিশীলতার উপর নির্ভরশীল। বৈশ্বিক অর্থনীতিতে মন্দা, আন্তর্জাতিক বাজারে তুলার মূল্যে উঠানামা, অবকাঠামোগত সীমাবদ্ধতা, সরকারী নীতি ব্যবস্থাপনা এবং রাজনৈতিক অস্থিরতা এ শিল্পকে দারুনভাবে প্রভাবিত করতে পারে।

এছাড়া, লৌহিত সাগরে পণ্যবাহি জাহাজ চলাচলে সৃষ্ট সমস্যার কারণে পণ্য পরিবহন খরচ উল্লেখ্যযোগ্য ভাবে বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে, যা ব্যবসায়িক কার্যক্রমকে আরো ব্যয়বহুল করে তুলেছে। অধিকম্ভ, অর্থনৈতিক মন্দার কারণে ডেনিম পণ্যের বৈশ্বিক চাহিদা উল্লেখ্যযোগ্য ভাবে হ্রাস পেয়েছে।

গ্যাসের স্বল্পতা এবং সাম্প্রতিক সময়ে কয়েক দফায় জ্বালানীর মূল্য বৃদ্ধির কারনে পণ্যের উৎপাদন ব্যয় বৃদ্ধি পাওয়ায় এ শিল্প ইতিমধ্যে দারুনভাবে আন্তর্জাতিক বাজারে প্রতিযোগীতার সম্মুখীন হচ্ছে এবং নিজেদের অন্তিতৃ টিকিয়ে রাখার লড়াই করছে। যার ফলশ্রুতিতে দেশীয় উৎপাদনকারীরা প্রতিযোগিতার সক্ষমতা হারাচ্ছে। অধিকন্ত, করোনা ভাইরাস প্রাদুর্ভাবে সমুদ্রপথে জাহাজ ভাড়া সাম্প্রতিক সময়ে অনেক বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে। এছাড়া ভাইরাসের প্রাদুর্ভাবে ফেব্রিক্সের আন্তর্জাতিক চাহিদা দৃশ্যমানভাবে হ্রাস পেয়েছে।

কোম্পানী এর নিম্নোক্ত বিভিন্ন ঝুঁকির বিষয়ে সজাগ রয়েছে এবং এসব ঝুঁকি মোকাবিলায় প্রয়োজনীয় নিয়ন্ত্রনমূলক ব্যবস্থাধীনে আছে ঃ

শিল্পপণ্যের বাজারজনিত ঝুঁকি

বাংলাদেশকে আন্তর্জাতিক বাজারে চীন, ভারত, পাকিস্তান, কম্বোডিয়া ও ভিয়েতনামের মতো প্রতিষ্ঠিত রপ্তানীকারক দেশগুলোর সাথে প্রতিযোগীতা করতে হয়। ইতিমধ্যে ভারত ও পাকিস্তানে ডলারের বিপরীতে দেশ দুটির স্থানীয় মুদ্রা অবমূল্যায়িত হওয়ায় আন্তর্জাতিক ক্রেতাদের নিকট এসব দেশ থেকে আমদানীকৃত ডেনিম পণ্যমূল্য সাশ্রয়ী হচ্ছে। সূতা উৎপাদনকারী দেশ হওয়াতে এদেশ দু'টির পণ্য উৎপাদন খরচ তুলনামূলক ভাবে কম থাকে। এছাড়াও পাকিস্তান ইউরোপীয় ইউনিয়নের বাজারে শুল্কমূক্ত পণ্য রপ্তানী সুবিধা পেয়েছে। অন্যদিকে চীনে ডেনিম পণ্যের উৎপাদন ব্যয় বৃদ্ধির ফলে আন্তর্জাতিক ক্রেতারা অন্যান্য মূল্য সাশ্রয়ী দেশের পাশাপাশি বাংলাদেশমূখী হচ্ছে।

এছাড়া বাংলাদেশের একটি সমৃদ্ধ তৈরী পোষাক শিল্প রয়েছে এবং ধারাবাহিক মানবসম্পদ উন্নয়নের মাধ্যমে উন্নত মানের মূল্যসাশ্রয়ী পণ্য উৎপাদনে বাংলাদেশ ইতিমধ্যে সক্ষমতা অর্জন করেছে, যা বাজারঝুঁকি মোকাবিলায় একটি নিয়ামক শক্তি।

চাহিদাজনিত ঝুঁকি

বর্তমানে বিশ্বের তরুণ সমাজ পছন্দসই ডেনিম সামগ্রী ক্রয়ের পরিবর্তে অত্যাধুনিক যোগাযোগ-প্রযুক্তি পণ্যের দিকে অধিক ঝুকে পড়ায় ডেনিম পণ্যের আশান্বিত চাহিদার প্রবৃদ্ধি হচ্ছে না। এছাড়াও কোন কোন বছরে জলবায়ু পরিবর্তনের প্রভাবে সৃষ্ট ঋতু বৈচিত্রের তারতম্যে ডেনিম পণ্যের চাহিদা ব্যাপক ভাবে হ্রাস-বৃদ্ধি হতে পারে।

মজুদ করে থাকে।

বৈদেশিক মুদ্রার বিনিময়হারজনিত ঝুঁকি

যেহেতু সম বৈদেশিক মূদ্রায় কাঁচামালের ক্রয় মূল্য পরিশোধিত হয় পণ্যের রপ্তানী আয় থেকে, ফলে বৈদেশিক মুদ্রার বিনিময় হারের তারতম্য স্বাভাবিকভাবে সমন্বয় হয়ে যায় এবং এ ঝুঁকি খুবই নগন্য।



ব্যবসায়িক কার্যক্রমের দক্ষতা

রাজস্ব খাত

কোম্পানী বিভিন্ন প্রকারের শুধুমাত্র ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্সই উৎপাদন ও রপ্তানী করে থাকে। কোম্পানীর মুনাফা একাধিক খাত থেকে অর্জিত হয়। কোম্পানীর রাজস্বের প্রধান উৎস হলো ব্যাক টু ব্যাক এলসির বিপরীতে রপ্তানীমুখী স্থানীয় পোশাক শিল্পের মাধ্যমে প্রচ্ছন্ন রপ্তানী আয়।

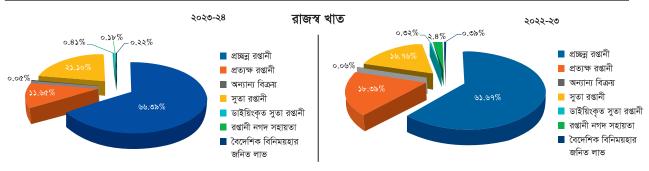
সরাসরি আন্তর্জাতিক ক্রেতাদের নিকট ফেব্রিক্স রপ্তানী থেকেও রাজস্ব অর্জিত হয়। কোম্পানীর মোট উৎপাদনের আনুমানিক ১০ থেকে ২০ শতাংশ ১৫টির অধিক দেশে সরাসরি রপ্তানী হয়ে থাকে। রাজস্বের একটি ক্ষুদ্র অংশ রপ্তানীর উপর সরকারের নগদ সহায়তা থেকে আসে। এছাড়াও অল্প কিছু পরিমাণ রাজস্ব রপ্তানীযোগ্য নয় এমন কিছু নিম্নমানের ফেব্রিক্স, স্যাম্পল ফেব্রিক্স ইত্যাদি বিক্রয় থেকে আসে।

বৈদেশিক মূদ্রার বিনিময়হার জনিত অর্জিত লাভ রাজস্ব আয়ের। খাত হিসেবে পৃথকভাবে দেখানো হয়।

এছাড়া রপ্তানীমূখী স্থানীয় নীট ডেনিম প্রতিষ্ঠানের নিকট ডায়িংকৃত সূতা রপ্তানীর মাধ্যমেও সামান্য পরিমান রাজস্ব অর্জিত হয়ে থাকে। কোম্পানীর নিজস্ব স্পিনিং ইউনিট থেকে উৎপাদিত সূতার ২৫ থেকে ৩০ শতাংশ পরিমান রপ্তানীমূখী স্থানীয় ডেনিম প্রতিষ্ঠানের নিকট রপ্তানী হয়ে থাকে।

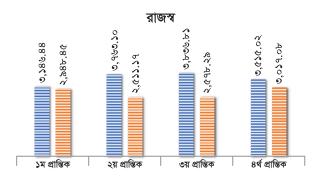

প্রথম ত্রৈমাসিক ফলাফলঃ

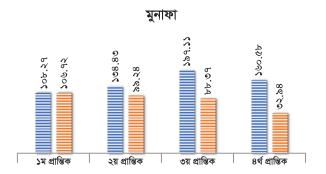
রাজস্বঃ গত বছরের ২,৯৪৮.৪৫ মিলিয়ন টাকার বিপরীতে এই বছরের একই সময়ে ৩,১৪৬.৪৪ মিলিয়ন টাকা রাজস্ব অর্জিত হয়েছে, যেটি গতবছরের তুলানায় ৬.৭২ শতাংশ বেশি। মুদ্রা বিনিময় হারের উর্জ্নগতির কারনে রপ্তানি আয়ে ইতিবাচক প্রভাব পড়েছে, যার ফলে রাজস্ব বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে। যদিও কাঁচামালের মূল্যবৃদ্ধি এবং সরবরাহ ব্যবস্থা বিঘ্লিত হওয়ায় এই রাজস্ব বৃদ্ধিতে কিছুটা নেতিবাচক প্রভাব পড়েছে।

মোট লাভঃ গত বছরের ৪৫৫.৩৯ মিলিয়ন টাকার বিপরীতে এই বছরের একই সময়ে ৪৫০.৫৯ মিলিয়ন টাকার মোট লাভ অর্জিত হয়েছে, যেটি গতবছরের তুলানায় ১.০৫ শতাংশ কম। গতবছরের তুলানায় গ্যাসের মূল্য বৃদ্ধি এবং একই সাথে ব্যাংকের সুদের হার বৃদ্ধি পাওয়ায় এসময় মোট লাভ কম অর্জিত হয়েছে। নীট লাভঃ গত বছরের ১০৬.৭২ মিলিয়ন টাকার বিপরীতে এই বছরের একই সময়ে ১০৮.২৭ মিলিয়ন টাকার নীট লাভ অর্জিত হয়েছে, যেটি গতবছরের তুলানায় ১.৪৫ শতাংশ বেশি। নীট লাভ সামান্য বাড়লেও গতবছরের একই সময়ের তুলনায় নীট লাভ অর্জনের হার কিছুটা কমেছে। যেটি মূলত গ্যাসের মূল্যবৃদ্ধি ও ব্যাংকের সুদের হার বৃদ্ধিজনিত কারণে হয়েছে।

দ্বিতীয় ত্রৈমাসিক ফলাফলঃ

রাজস্বঃ গত বছরের ২,৫১১.১৭ মিলিয়ন টাকার বিপরীতে এই বছরের একই সময়ে ৩,৭৬৩.১০ মিলিয়ন টাকা রাজস্ব অর্জিত হয়েছে, যেটি গতবছরের তুলানায় ৪৯.৮৫ শতাংশ বেশি। এই সময়ে অর্থনৈতিক মন্দা কাটিয়ে যুক্তরাজ্য এবং যুক্তরাষ্ট্রের বাজারে ডেনিম পণ্যের চাহিদা বৃদ্ধি পাওয়াতে গতবছরের একই সময়ের তুলনায় রাজস্ব বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে।

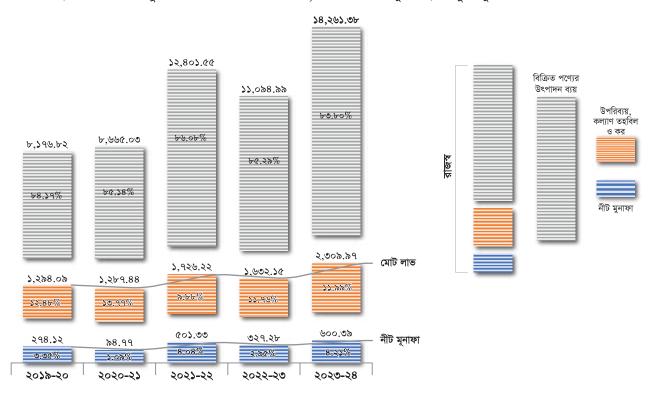

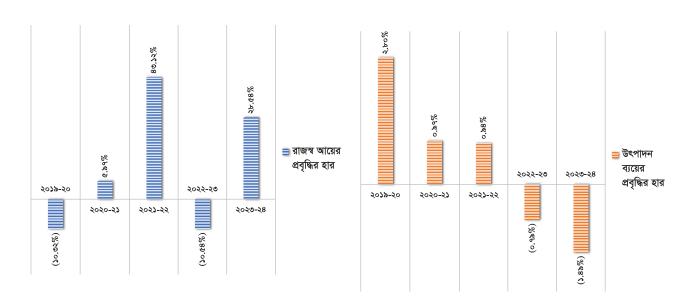

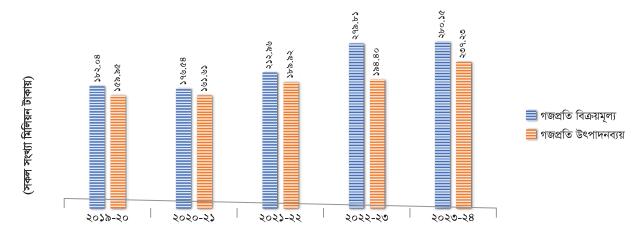

পরিচালনগত আর্থিক ফলাফলে প্রভাব বিস্তারকারী গুরুত্বপূর্ণ বিষয়সমূহ ঃ

২০২২-২৩ এর তুলনায় ২০২৩-২৪ অর্থবছরের কোম্পানির পরিচালনগত আর্থিক ফলাফলের একটি সংক্ষিপ্ত বিবরণ তুলে ধরছি। বৈশ্বিক অনিশ্চয়তা সত্ত্বেও আমরা এবছরে দৃশ্যমান প্রবৃদ্ধি এবং পরিচালনাগত দক্ষতা অর্জন করেছি, যা আমাদের বাজারে দৃঢ় অবস্থান এনে দিয়েছে।

রাজস্ব বৃদ্ধি এবং চাহিদার উত্থান

২০২৩-২৪ অর্থবছরে কোম্পানীর রাজস্ব দাড়িয়েছে ১৪,২৬১.৩৮ মিলিয়ন টাকা, যা ২০২২-২৩ অর্থবছরের ১১,০৯৪.৯৯ মিলিয়ন টাকা থেকে ২৮.৫৪ শতাংশ বেশি। আন্তর্জাতিক বাজারে ডেনিম পন্যের চাহিদার বৃদ্ধির ফলে এই প্রবৃদ্ধি অর্জন সম্ভব হয়েছে। আমরা ২০২৩-২৪ অর্থবছরে ৩৯.৭৫ মিলিয়ন গজ ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স বিক্রয় করেছি, যা গত অর্থবছরের তুলনায় ২৫.১২ শতাংশ বেশি। বিশ্ববানিজ্যে অস্থিতিশীল অবস্থা থাকা সত্ত্বেও, আমরা নতুন বাজার সৃষ্টির সুযোগ কাজে লাগিয়েছি এবং বিদ্যমান ক্রেতাদের সাথে সম্পর্ক বজায় রেখে এ সফলতা অর্জন করেছি।

ব্যয় দক্ষতা ও মুনাফা অর্জন সক্ষমতা

আমরা ব্যর ব্যবস্থাপনা কৌশলকে সফলভাবে কাজে লাগিয়েছি। বিক্রিত পন্যের উৎপাদন খরচ গতবছরের রাজস্বের তুলনায় ১.৪৯ শতাংশ হ্রাস পেয়ে এবছর ১১,৯৫১.৪১ মিলিয়ন টাকায় দাড়িয়েছে। কাঁচামালের খরচ কমানো সত্ত্বেও, গ্যাসের মূল্যবৃদ্ধির কারনে উৎপাদন খরচ কিছুটা বেড়েছে। এর ফলে মোট মুনাফা ২,৩০৯.৯৭ মিলিয়ন টাকা অর্জিত হয়েছে, যা গত বছরের ১,৬৩২.১৫ মিলিয়ন টাকা থেকে ৪১.৫৩ শতাংশ বেশি।

আর্থিক ব্যয় ও অন্যান আয়

পরিচালনগত দক্ষতা অর্জন করা সম্ভব হলেও, ব্যাংকের সুদের হার বৃদ্ধির কারনে গতবছরের তুলনায় এবছর আর্থিক ব্যয় বেড়েছে ৪৬৯.২৫ মিলিয়ন টাকা। তবে, আমরা মুদ্রার বিনিময় হার জনিত ৪৮.১৫ মিলিয়ন টাকা আয় উপার্জন করতে সক্ষম হয়েছি।

কর পূর্ব ও কর পরবর্তী নীট মুনাফা

আমরা সফল ব্যয় নিয়ন্ত্রণ কৌশল এবং রাজস্ব বৃদ্ধির মাধ্যমে কর-পূর্ব নীট মুনাফা ৭১৬.১৮ মিলিয়ন টাকা অর্জন করতে সক্ষম হয়েছি, যা গতবছরের তুলনায় ৩৮.৪৭ শতাংশ বেশি। এছাড়াও ৫০ শতাংশ উৎস কর ছাড়ের কারনে আমাদের কর বাবদ ব্যয় ৩৯.০৪ শতাংশ হ্রাস পেয়ে ১১৫.৭৯ মিলিয়ন টাকা হয়েছে। ফলস্বরূপ, আমরা কর-পরবর্তী নীট মুনাফা ৬০০.৩৯ মিলিয়ন টাকা অর্জন করেছি, যা এযাবৎ কালের সর্বোচ্চ এবং গতবছরের তুলনায় ৮৩.৪৫ শতাংশ বেশি।

আমাদের উৎপাদন ক্ষমতার ব্যবহার ৭৪.৬১ শতাংশে উন্নীত হয়েছে, যা গতবছরের অর্জিত ৬৪.০৫ শতাংশ থেকে ১৬.৪৯ শতাংশ বেড়েছে। এ উন্নতি আমাদের উৎপাদন দক্ষতার প্রতিফলন এবং ক্রমবর্ধমান বাজারের চাহিদা পূরনে কোম্পানীর পরিচালনগত দক্ষতাকে প্রকাশ করে।

নীট পরিচালনগত নগদ প্রবাহ

শেয়ারপ্রতি নীট পরিচালনগত নগদ প্রবাহ কমে ৩.৬৮ টাকায় দাড়িয়েছে, যা গতবছর ছিল ৬.৯৯ টাকা। এটি একটি সাধারণ ব্যবসায়িক পরিচালনগত প্রক্রিয়া, যা রাজস্ব বৃদ্ধির ফলে পাওনা আদায় হিসেবের জের কম-বেশি হওয়ার কারনে হয়েছে।

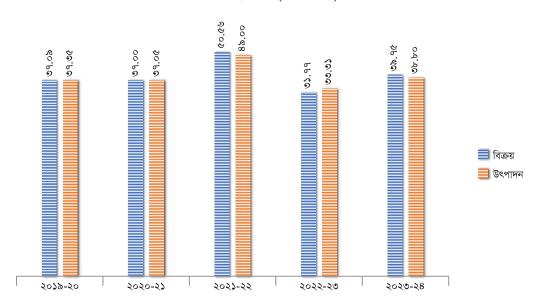

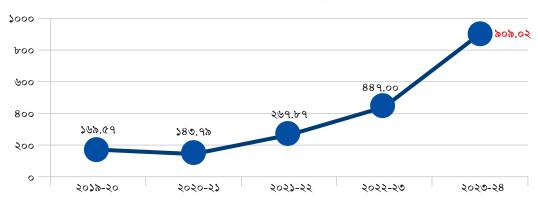

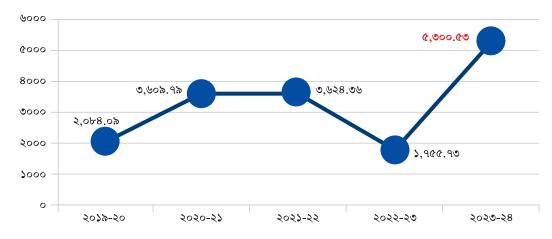

চলমান ধারাবাহিকতায় কোম্পানীর সক্ষমতা নিয়ে পরিচালকদের নিকট সন্দেহের উদ্রেক হয়নি এবং অবিরত ব্যবসা পরিচালনার জন্য প্রয়োজনীয় আর্থিক সক্ষমতা রয়েছে বলে তাঁরা যুক্তিসংগত ভাবে আশা করেন। এ কারনে চলমান ব্যবসার ভিত্তিতে আর্থিক হিসাব বিবরণী প্রস্তুত করা হয়েছে।



প্রাথমিক গণ প্রস্তাবের মাধ্যমে সংগৃহীত অর্থের ব্যয়

কোম্পানী ২০১২ সালে প্রাথমিক গণ প্রস্তাবের মাধ্যমে মূলধন সংগ্রহ করেছিল। এই সংগৃহীত মূলধন পুরোপুরি ব্যয়িত হয়েছে এবং তা যথাযথ ভাবে রিপোর্ট করা হয়েছে।

লিস্টিং পরবর্তী আর্থিক ফলাফল

কোম্পানী ২০১২ সালে স্টক এক্সচেঞ্জের সাথে লিস্টেড হয়, তৎপরবর্তী আর্থিক ফলাফল বিশ্লেষনে দেখা যায়, কোম্পানীর রাজস্ব আহরণের পরিমান বাৎসরিক ধারাবাহিকভাবে বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে, অন্যদিকে মুনাফা প্রথমদিকে ধারাবাহিকভাবে বৃদ্ধি পেলেও শেষের তিন বছরে এ ধারাবাহিকতা ছিল না। এর মূল কারণ হলো, এ সময়ে জ্বালানী ও কাঁচামালের মূল্য অত্যাধিক ভাবে বৃদ্ধি পাওয়ায় ফেব্রিক্সের উৎপাদনমূল্য অনেক বেড়ে যায়। অন্যদিকে, করোনা ভাইরাসের প্রভাবে চাহিদা কমে যাওয়ায় প্রতিযোগীতামূলক বাজারে পণ্যের বিক্রয়মূল্য সমন্বয় করা সম্ভব হয়নি।

২০২১-২২ অর্থ বছরে এসব প্রতিকূলতা কাটিয়ে কোম্পানী সফল ভাবে ঘুরে দাড়িয়েছিল। চলমান রাশিয়া-ইউক্রেন দ্বন্দের ফলে সৃষ্ঠ অর্থনৈতিক মন্দা, তদুপরি পোষাক শিল্পের অন্যতম ভোক্তা-যুক্তরাষ্ট্রে মূল্যক্ষীতির ফলে ব্যাংক সুদহার বৃদ্ধি পাওয়াতে ক্রেতাদের ক্রয় ক্ষমতাহ্রাস পায়। এসব কারনে যুক্তরাষ্ট্র এবং ইউরোপ থেকে রপ্তানী আদেশ কমে যাওয়ায় এ অর্থ বছরে তুলনামূলক কম নীট লাভ অর্জিত হয়েছে।

যুক্তরাষ্ট্র এবং ইউরোপে ডেনিম পন্যের চাহিদা বাড়ায় ২০২৩-২৪ অর্থবছরে রাজস্ব উল্লেখযোগ্য হারে বেড়েছে। যার ফলশ্রুতিতে গত অর্থবছরের তুলনায় এই অর্থবছরে নীট লাভ ৮৩.৪৫ শতাংশ বেড়েছে, যা লিস্টিং পরবর্তী কোম্পানীর সবোর্চ্চ অর্জিত মুনাফা।

সংখ্যালঘুদের স্বার্থ রক্ষা

সংখ্যালঘুদের স্বার্থ যথাযথভাবে সংরক্ষিত হয়েছে। ২০২৩-২৪ অর্থবছরে বোর্ড কর্তৃক এমন কোন সিদ্ধান্ত গৃহিত হয়নি যাতে সংখ্যালঘুদের স্বার্থক্ষুন্নের বিষয়টি জড়িত ছিল।

অগ্রাধিকারমূলক শেয়ার ইস্যু

মূলধনী বিনিয়োগের উদ্দেশ্যে কোম্পানী প্রাইভেট প্লেসমেন্টের মাধ্যমে ৮৭০ মিলিয়ন টাকার সমমূল্যের প্রতিটি ১০ টাকা অভিহিত মূল্যে ৮৭,০০০,০০০ অগ্রাধিকার শেয়ার ইস্যু করেছিল, যার মধ্যে মোট ৩২,০০০,০০০ অগ্রাধিকার শেয়ার বন্টনের মাধ্যমে ৩২০ মিলিয়ন টাকা সংগৃহীত হয়েছে।

উল্লেখিত অগ্রাধিকার শেয়ার ৫ বছরের মধ্যে সম্পূর্ণ পরিশোধ যোগ্য, ক্রমবর্ধমান, ও অ-পরিবর্তনীয়।

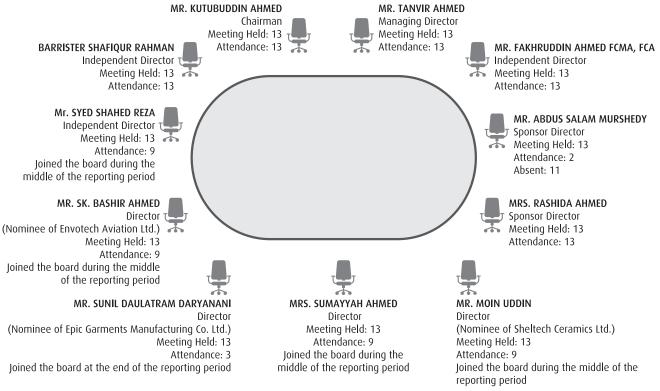

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

This report covers the operations and financial performance of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2024

OVERALL REVIEW

Bangladesh has firmly established itself as the leading denim exporter to both the EU and USA, with denim exports witnessing consistent growth. The country currently holds approximately 25% of the global denim market, a testament to its expanding influence in the textile industry.

The global denim market is projected to experience substantial growth, expected to reach USD 76.1 billion by 2026, with an annual growth rate of 4.8%. Bangladesh's denim sector has undergone remarkable expansion, now boasting investments of nearly BDT 250 billion. Supported by 42 state-of-the-art mills, the country can now produce over 900 million meters of denim fabric annually. This marks a significant leap from a decade ago, when investments were around BDT 80 billion with only 12 mills in operation.

Bangladesh has surpassed China as the top denim supplier to key markets such as the EU and the USA. Besides, emerging markets like India, Japan, China, Latin America, and the Middle East have become important export destinations, further diversifying Bangladesh's denim industry.

While investment in denim manufacturing has surged, product prices have remained largely

stable. However, there has been a notable increase in investment toward eco-friendly, LEED-certified factories that prioritize sustainable production processes, enhancing both product quality and compliance with international standards. This shift toward sustainability aligns with growing global awareness of environmental issues, but it has also increased production costs as manufacturers adopt greener technologies.

The sector faces additional challenges, including high inflation in key Western markets and the ongoing economic repercussions of the Russia-Ukraine conflict. Rising energy costs, disruptions in the supply chain, and fluctuating demand due to economic uncertainty have impacted the industry. Nevertheless, the global emphasis on sustainability and compliance with stringent buyer standards has compelled

entrepreneurs to continue investing heavily in modernizing their operations. Despite these pressures, product prices have remained largely unchanged, leading to an imperative for the industry to reevaluate and adjust denim pricing to reflect the rising costs associated with sustainable production and compliance requirements.

Looking ahead, maintaining Bangladesh's competitive edge will require balancing investment in environmental sustainability with the challenges posed by inflation, geopolitical tensions, and shifting market dynamics. The country's denim industry must continue to adapt to ensure long-term growth and stability in the face of these evolving challenges.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE:

We are pleased to present an analysis of our cost, operating and earnings performance over the past five fiscal years, providing a clear view of how our operational costs, efficiency, and profitability have evolved.

Cost of Raw Materials

The Cost of Raw Materials has shown a fluctuating pattern over the past five years, with significant growth in recent periods:

In 2023-24, it stood at BDT 8,919.40 million, marking a 14.9% increase over 2022-23, primarily driven by exchange rate fluctuations.

The cost in 2021-22 was BDT 8,227.44 million, relatively stable compared to the previous year, but it dropped significantly during 2020-21 due to lower production volumes and raw material prices (BDT 5,004.76 million).

The lowest raw material cost was in 2019-20 at BDT 4,881.74 million.

The percentage of raw material costs relative to total production costs has remained relatively stable, ranging between 68% and 77%, indicating that material costs are the dominant factor in production expenses. The lower percentage in 2020-21 (68.25%) was due to a decrease in raw material prices during that period.

Other Production Overhead

Other Production Overhead has increased steadily, reaching BDT 2,812.51 million in 2023-24, compared to BDT 2,340.05 million in 2022-23, a rise of 20.2%.

Overhead costs have shown consistent growth, reflecting inflationary pressures and higher operational costs.

Total Cost of Production

Total production costs reached BDT 11,731.91 million in 2023-24, up from BDT 10,102.26 million in the previous year.

The increase in production costs has been driven by both raw material costs and overheads, especially in the last two years as we faced global supply chain disruptions and currency fluctuations.

This trend indicates that while we have been growing in terms of output, the rising cost of inputs continues to challenge profitability.

Cost per Yard

The Cost per Yard has risen sharply, from BDT 159.95 in 2019-20 to BDT 237.23 in 2023-24, indicating a significant increase in production costs.

The largest year-on-year increase occurred in 2023-24, where the cost rose to BDT 237.23 from BDT 194.40 in 2022-23, reflecting the inflationary pressures, higher raw material prices, and currency exchange impacts.

Cost of Goods Sold (COGS)

The COGS has steadily increased in line with production costs, reaching BDT 11,951.41 million in 2023-24, compared to BDT 9,462.84 million in 2022-23 and BDT 10,675.33 million in 2021-22.

The COGS as a percentage of revenue has improved over time, declining from 86.08% in 2021-22 to 83.80% in 2023-24, showing progress in cost management relative to revenue generation.

Gross Profit (GP)

Gross Profit has improved significantly in 2023-24, rising to BDT 2,309.97 million from BDT 1,632.15 million in 2022-23. This marks a 41.5% increase, reflecting better pricing strategies and improved cost control.

The GP Ratio has also improved to 16.20% in 2023-24, from 14.71% in 2022-23 and 13.92% in 2021-22, showing our ability to maintain a healthy margin despite rising costs.

Net Profit after Tax (NPAT)

Our Net Profit after Tax for 2023-24 increased substantially to BDT 600.39 million, compared to BDT 327.28 million in the previous year, a growth of 83.4%.

Although there was a slight dip in NPAT in 2022-23 due to higher costs, the overall trend shows recovery and growth, with a Net Profit Margin reaching 4.21% in 2023-24 from 2.95% in 2022-23.

Rate of Inflation

The inflation rate is a critical macroeconomic factor that affects purchasing power, operational costs,



and profitability. Over the past six years, the inflation rate shows an increasing trend.

The rising inflationary pressures, especially in the last two fiscal years, have likely contributed to increased operating costs, thereby impacting profitability and cash flows.

Restated Net Profit (Inflation Adjusted)

Inflation-adjusted net profit reflects the real earnings of the company after adjusting for the inflationary impact. The net profit shows volatility over the six-year period:

2023-24: BDT 547.15 million (83% increase YoY)

2022-23: BDT 300.20 million (-36% YoY)

2021-22: BDT 472.27 million (426% increase YoY)

2020-21: BDT 89.78 million (-65% YoY)

2019-20: BDT 259.46 million (-51% YoY)

The notable growth in net profit in FY 2023-24 compared to FY 2022-23, despite a challenging inflationary environment, reflects improved operational performance. However, the fluctuations over the years indicate sensitivity to external factors, possibly including inflation and exchange rate volatility.

Earnings Per Share (EPS)

Earnings per share provide a snapshot of profitability available to shareholders. EPS has seen considerable fluctuations during the analyzed period:

2023-24: 3.58 (84% increase YoY)

2022-23: 1.95 (-35% YoY)

2021-22: 2.99 (434% increase YoY)

2020-21: 0.56 (-66% YoY)

2019-20: 1.63 (-19% YoY)

The significant rebound in EPS in FY 2023-24 (84% YoY increase) after the dip in FY 2022-23 signals a strong recovery in profitability. This reflects improved operational efficiency and possibly better cost management, despite the inflationary environment.

Net Asset Value (NAV)

NAV per share reflects the value of the company's assets less liabilities, representing the residual interest of shareholders. Over the past six years, NAV has grown consistently:

2023-24: 51.93 (34.6% increase YoY)

2022-23: 38.57 (0.9% increase YoY)

2021-22: 38.21 (1.1% increase YoY)

2020-21: 37.79 (-1.7% YoY)

2019-20: 38.43 (0.2% increase YoY)

The increase in NAV in FY 2023-24 reflects the company's ability to retain earnings and grow asset value, which is a positive sign of long-term financial stability.

Net Operating Cash Flow per Share (NOCFS)

NOCFS represents the cash generated from operations on a per-share basis, offering insight into the liquidity and operational efficiency of the business. Over the analyzed period, the company's NOCFS has been mostly volatile.

Despite the growth in net profit, NOCFS has shown a significant decline in FY 2023-24 compared to FY 2022-23. The decline in NOCFS despite increased earnings due to increase in receivables.

PEER ORGANIZATION SCENARIO

In order to assess our company's performance, we have conducted a comprehensive analysis comparing our financial performances to that of three peer organizations: Argon Denim, Evince Textiles, and Pacific Denim. The analysis encompasses the last four years' data, which has been obtained from the Dhaka Stock Exchange website.

During this period, our company exhibited an average EPS of Taka 1.78, while the peer organizations' average EPS stood at Taka 0.39. This indicates that our company's average EPS outperformed the industry average.

Furthermore, we also evaluated the Average Net Asset Value (NAV) per share for the years 2019-20 to 2022-23. Our company recorded a NAV of Taka 38.79, surpassing the peer organizations' average NAV of Taka 17.44 for the same period. This demonstrates that our company's net assets per share have consistently outperformed those of our

Our analysis of the peer organization scenario suggests that our company has exhibited stronger financial performance, as evidenced by higher average EPS and NAV per share figures when compared to the industry average.



RISK AND CONCERNS

The volatility of the currency, particularly against the dollar, poses significant challenges for long-term order bookings. Moreover, there is a consistent increase in cotton prices, as well as other input costs such as power and logistics. The soaring cost of natural gas has made its use as a power source impractical.

The plan for mitigating these risks and concerns has been outlined in the Directors Report under the section titled 'Risks and Concerns.'

Accounting Policies and Estimations:

Fixed Assets

Property, plant, and equipment (PPE) comprise assets such as factory buildings, equipment, vehicles, and software, which are valued at their historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Some assets, like land and buildings, are measured at fair value in compliance with IAS-16. Depreciation is applied using the reducing balance method, with no depreciation charged on land and capital work-in-progress. Depreciation is applied to other assets when they become available for use.

Intangible assets are acquired and have finite useful lives. They are measured at cost less accumulated amortization and impairment losses, if any. Amortization is based on a reducing balance method over five years from the date they become available for use. No internally developed intangible assets were capitalized during the year.

The company's land was revalued as of 26 June 2024, leading to a revaluation gain of BDT 1.9 billion. This gain was credited to a "Revaluation Surplus" under shareholders' equity. The revaluation was limited to land, and other asset classes remained unchanged.

The company reviews assets for impairment at each reporting date. If the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognized. No assets were found to be impaired during the reporting period.

Subsequent costs related to replacing parts of PPE are recognized in the asset's carrying amount if they are expected to provide future economic benefits and can be measured reliably. No assets were disposed of during the period, but any gain or loss on disposal would be recognized under other income.

Capital work-in-progress represents costs for assets that were not yet ready for use at the end of the year and are stated at cost. Inventories, including raw materials, work-in-progress, and finished goods, are valued at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and bank deposits with a maturity of three months or less and are free of encumbrances.

Taxation:

The company enjoyed a tax holiday for a duration of four years, starting from 1 March 2008, and ending on 29 February 2012. During the tax holiday period, 40% of the company's net profit was transferred to the tax holiday reserve. After the expiration of the tax holiday period, an appropriate provision has been made for current and deferred tax liabilities, based on the prevailing rate

Segment Reporting:

Segment reporting is not applicable for the current year, as the company does not meet the criteria required for segment reporting.

Revenue Recognition:

Sales of Goods:

Revenue from the sale of goods shall be acknowledged upon fulfillment of the subsequent criteria:

- a. The company has transferred the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods to the buyer.
- b. The company has relinquished any continuing managerial involvement or effective control over the goods sold.
- c. The amount of revenue can be measured with reliability.
- d. There is a high likelihood that the economic benefits linked to the transaction will accrue to the company.
- e. The cost incurred or to be incurred for the transaction can be measured with reliability.

Other Income and Expenses:

Other income and expenses are recognized when received.



Foreign Exchange Transactions:

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted into BDT at the exchange rate on the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities expressed in foreign currencies are translated into BDT at the exchange rate prevailing at the balance sheet date. Gains or losses resulting from foreign currency transactions are recorded in the profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Financial Expenses:

Borrowing costs are recognized as expenses in the period in which they are incurred, and any costs incurred before the commencement of commercial operations are capitalized.

Earnings:

This represents earnings for the year attributable to ordinary shareholders. As there were no preference dividends, minority interests, or extraordinary items, the net profit after tax for the period is considered fully attributable to the ordinary shareholders.

Financial Instruments:

Financial assets and liabilities are recognized on the balance sheet when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Accounts Receivables:

Accounts receivables are stated at their nominal value and are considered as good.

Accounts Payables:

Accounts payables are stated at their nominal value, and no bank acceptance is provided as of the reporting date.

Due to and due from Related Parties:

Due to and due from related parties are stated at their nominal value.

Borrowings or Secured Loan:

Bank loans and overdrafts that bear interest are recognized at the amount received as proceeds. Finance charges related to these borrowings are accounted for on an accrual basis.

No changes in accounting policies and estimations were made during the reporting period.

FORWARD LOOKING

The textile industry has a promising growth potential as Chinese exports are slowing down due to various factors, including increased domestic demand and rising costs. This presents a valuable opportunity for our textile industry to capitalize on. However, challenges such as inadequate power supply, elevated power costs, and higher borrowing expenses are impeding our progress. Nevertheless, we are actively addressing these challenges through continuous efforts to reduce costs, improve processes, diversify our product range, and enhance productivity by optimizing efficiencies.

We are pleased to note that our financial performance has stabilized and is displaying signs of improvement, including increased capacity utilization. This, in turn, has led to enhanced export sales, driven by growing demand in global markets. The performance of our Spinning Division is gradually improving, despite the depressed denim fabric market observed in the past year. We remain hopeful that the denim fabric market will rebound in the current year.

Nonetheless, we maintain a strong sense of optimism for the future and anticipate positive outcomes.

After obtaining an LLB (Hons.) and an LLM from the University of Dhaka, Mr. Shafigur Rahman went to England to study law at the University of London, where he achieved a second Honours degree in law. He completed his bar vocational course at the University of Northumbria at Newcastle, earning a 'very competent' grade. He became a member of Lincoln's Inn and was called to the bar in 2002. Upon returning to Bangladesh, he joined the Chambers of Dr. M. Zahir, a prominent corporate and constitutional expert in Bangladesh, and remained with him until Dr. Zahir's unfortunate demise in 2013. Mr. Shafigur Rahman enjoyed the benefits of working in Dr. Zahir's prestigious corporate chambers, which included dealing with large multinational corporate clients such as Chevron, Lafarge, Youngone, Procter and Gamble, British American Tobacco, US Fibres, Haewae, Cathay Pacific, as well as prominent local clients like Berger, MJL Bangladesh Ltd., Grameenphone, Renata, IIDFC, IDLC, ACI, ONE Bank, AB Bank, LankaBangla Finance, Independent

University, American International University, HRC Shipping, and others. While mainly practicing as a litigator in the Supreme Court, Mr. Shafigur Rahman also engages in opinion writing, drafting contracts, and vetting legal documents as part of his daily routine. Currently, he serves as the Managing Director of the Newage Group Companies, reputable business conglomerates involved in export-oriented manufacturing of knit fabrics and garment accessories.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of ENVOY TEXTILES LIMITED (The "Company") which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2024 and the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive Income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes, comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the company as at 30 June 2024, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the company in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the IESBA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter

We draw attention to note 3.06 of the financial statements, which describes matters related to the revaluation of the Company's land and land development.

Key Audit Matters (KAM)

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in the audit of the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2024. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming the auditor's opinion thereon and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. SL. Key audit matter

During the year the land and land development decided to change the measurement basis of land from revaluation model incorporating the revalued amount based on the valuation conducted by an independent external valuer.

The revaluation has resulted in fair value gain of Taka 1,895,162,303.00

There is risk of:

- Determination of fair value in absence of any quoted price and active market require significant judgment.
- Determining which costs meet the criteria for capitalization;
- Determining the date on which the assets is recognized to property, plant and equipment and depreciation commences;
- ✓ The estimation of economic useful lives and residual values assigned to Property, Plant and Equipment.

We identified the carrying value of property, plant and equipment as key audit matter because of the high level of management judgment involved and because of its significance to the financial statements.

How our audit addressed the key audit matter.

checked whether the items were procured based on internal purchase order that had been properly approved by the responsible individuals.

- We inspected a sample of invoices and L/C documents to determine whether the classification between capital and operating expenditure was appropriate.
- We evaluated whether the useful lives determined and applied by the management were in line with historical experience and the market practice.
- We checked whether the depreciation of Property, Plant and Equipment items was commenced timely, by comparing the date of the reclassification from capital in progress to ready for use, with the date of the act of completion of the work.

Assessing the design, implementation and operating effectiveness of key internal controls over the completeness, existence and accuracy estimation of useful economic lives and residual values of property, plant and Equipment;

02 Revenue Recognition (Refer to notes 3.12 and 27 to the financial statements)

The company reported total revenue of Taka 14,261,381,187.00 for the year ended 30 June 2024.

Revenue is measured including incentives by customers on the company's sales. Within a number of the company's markets, the estimation of incentives recognized based on Sales made during the year are material and considered to be complex and judgmental.

The terms of sales agreements, including the timing of transfer of control, based on the terms of relevant contract and nature of commission, incentive, bonus and discounts arrangements, create complexities that requires judgment in determining sales revenues.

Our audit procedures included the following:

- We assessed the appropriateness of revenue recognition accounting policy in line with IFRS 15 "Revenue from contracts with customers"
- Tested the internal control over financial reporting. We also assessed the existence and accuracy of the sales recorded;
- We performed analytical test to understand how the revenue has trended over the year among other parameters, we performed a detailed substantive testing on transactions around the year end to ensure revenues were recognized in the correct accounting period.
- We also tested journal entries focusing on sales transactions;



Key audit matter Considering the above factors and the risk associated with revenue recognition, we have determined the same to be a key audit matter. Finally assessed the appropriateness and presentation of disclosures against relevant accounting standards.

03 Valuation of Inventories & Stores. (Refer to notes 3.07 and 8 to the financial statements)

The amount of Taka. 4,852,504,256 have been reported as inventories & stores in the financial statements.

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realizable value. As a result, management has applied judgment in determining the appropriate values for inventories.

Considering the above factors and the risk associated with the determination of net realizable value of inventories, We have determined the same to be a key audit matter.

Our audit included the following procedures:

- Evaluating the design and implementation of key inventory controls operating across the factory and warehouse;
- Reconciling the inventories with opening inventories, purchase, production and sales during the period and with closing inventories;
- Testing, on a sample basis the stock expiry dates and the market price used in assessing the net realizable values of inventories of the related supporting documents.
- Comparing the net realizable value, obtained through a detailed review of sales subsequent to the year-end, to the cost price of a sample of inventories.

Long term loan with current portion & Short-term loan. (Refer to notes 3.18 and 18, 22 and 23 to the financial statements)

At the end of financial year, the position of loans remained amounting to Taka 10,441,777,527.00 (Secured Loan, Secured Loan (Current Portion) and Short Term Liabilities) for the company.

Evidently, the company is using loans to operate the business and also, to acquire non-current assets.

Therefore, it has been considered as key audit

We obtained an understanding, evaluated the design, and tested the operational effectiveness of the company's key controls over the loans. Our audit procedures included, among others, the following:

- Understanding and reviewing the nature and type of loans and reviewing the board minutes for arrangements of the loans;
- Obtaining the repayment schedules, loan statements and facility offer letters to review terms, interest rates and other conditions associated with the loans;
- Reviewing the mortgages, major covenants, guarantees and interest rates etc. attached to the loans;
- Checking the adjustments or repayments of loans through bank statements as per repayment schedules;
- Checking whether there is any overdue payments and penal interests; and finally, assessing the appropriateness and presentation of disclosures against relevant accounting standards.

05 Trade and others Receivable (Refer to notes 3.18 and 10 to the financial statements)

The Company has a trade and other receivable of Taka 5,422,821,282 as at 30 June 2024.

The company is 100% export-oriented, which includes direct export through L/C and deemed export; therefore receivable confirmation is a material issue, which requires proper correspondence with debtors.

Our substantive procedures in relation to the assessing trade receivable comprises the following:

- Obtained a list of outstanding receivables;
- Reconciliation of receivables ageing to general ledger;
- Conducting cut-off testing at the year-end;
- Confirmed with the client balance through receivable confirmation Letters.
- Reviewing subsequent receipt of receivables balance.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises all of the information in the annual report other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The annual report is expected to be made available to us after the date of this auditor's report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When we read the annual report, if we conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, we are required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance.

1.00 Legal status and nature of the Company – Disclosure under IAS 1 as adopted by Institution of Chartered Accountants of Bangladesh as "Presentation of Financial Statements"

a. Background of the Company

Envoy Textiles Limited was incorporated as a private company limited by shares registered under the Companies Act, 1994. Vide registration no. C-28622 (2468)/1995 dated 18 June 1995 and converted into public limited company on 25 October 2009. The registered office of the company is located at Envoy Tower, 18/E Lake Circus Kalabagan (West Panthapath), Dhaka-1205.

Envoy Textiles Limited had taken over the business, all assets and liabilities of Edge Denims Limited (incorporated as a private company limited by shares registered under The Companies act, 1994. vide registration no. C-28622 (2468)/1995 dated 18 June 1995) as per decision of the Extraordinary General Meetings of both the companies held on 19 June 2009 with the consent of the Honorable Supreme Court of Bangladesh, High Court Division vide Company Matters no. 70 of 2009 and No. 71 of 2009 with effect from 30 September 2009 and Edge Denims Limited has no more in existence.

b. Activities of the Company

Envoy Textiles Limited is a manufacturer of 100% export-oriented denim fabrics with advanced quality denim fabric finishing and yarn manufacturing industry. It is the first rope denims plant in Bangladesh with highly sophisticated machineries of USA, Europe and Japan. Commercial operation of the company started from 01 March 2008.

3.00 Basis of Preparation:

3.01 Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements are prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standards (IASs) and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs), the Companies Act 1994, Securities and Exchange Rules, 2020 and other applicable laws and regulations.

3.03 Measurement Bases used in preparing the Financial Statements.

3.05 Specific accounting policies selected and applied for significant transactions and events.

3.06 Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, Plant & Equipment comprises Factory Building, Rest House, Officer and Staff Quarter, Corporate Office Building, Factory Equipment, Furniture & Fixture, Machinery, ETP Cost, Office Equipment, Motor Vehicle, Software etc. Fixed assets are stated at their historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Land, building, other construction, machineries/equipments, ETP cost and office spaces measured and valued at fair value in compliance with International Accounting Standards (IASs)-16 "Property, Plant & Equipment".

Depreciation:

No depreciation has been charged on the Land and Land Development. Depreciation is charged on all other assets on reducing balance method. Depreciation has been charged on addition during the year when an asset becomes available for use. No depreciation is charged for land and capital work-in-progress. The rates of depreciation are as follows:

Intangible Asset:

Intangible asset that are acquired by the company has finite useful lives are measured at cost less Accumulated Amortization and Accumulated impairment losses, if any Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates.

Intangible assets are amortized on a reducing-line basis in profit or loss over their estimated useful lives of 5 years from the date that they are available for use. Amortization methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate. No internal developed intangible assets capitalized during the year.

Revaluation of Fixed Assets

The fixed assets as on 30 June 2010 have been revalued at fair market value as per decision of the board of directors. All fixed assets under land, building, machineries and equipment available on the cut of date on 30 June 2010 were revalued by an independent valuation company named Asian Surveyors Limited. The revaluation of assets has been made at present market value of land, building, machinery and equipment allowing due depreciation on building, machinery and equipment for the month which has already been expired from the estimate total useful life.

Recently, the Board of Directors of Envoy Textiles Limited at its 234th meeting held on 26 June 2024 accepted the valuation report of abridge version (Annexure-B) submitted by the professional valuer named Asian surveyors Ltd. This revaluation was limited exclusively to the company's land property, with other asset classes remaining unchanged.



Before revaluation the amount of land and land development was BDT 1,554,115,297 and after revaluation the amount is BDT 3,439,277,600, resulting total revaluation gain 1,895,162,303. Details are given below:

The revaluation of land, building, machinery and equipment are credited to "Revaluation Surplus" under shareholders equity. Amount of depreciation on revaluation surplus excluding land and land development has been credited to retained earnings by debiting revaluation surplus as per IAS-16: Property, Plant and Equipment.

Impairment of assets

An asset is impaired when its carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The company assesses at each reporting date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset. The recoverable amount of an asset is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. Carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount by recognizing an impairment loss if, and only if, the recoverable amount of the asset is less than its carrying amount. Impairment loss is recognized immediately in profit or loss, unless the asset is carried at revalued amount. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset shall be treated as a revaluation decrease. During the reporting year, no indication of impairment of any assets was found.

Subsequent Cost

Subsequent to initial recognition, cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the Company and its cost can be measured reliably.

Disposal of Fixed Assets

An asset is recognized on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use and subsequent disposal. Gain or loss arising from the retirement or disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognized as gain or loss from disposal of asset under other income in the statements of comprehensive income. There was no disposal of asset during the period.

Capital Work in Progress

Capital work-in-progress represent the cost incurred for acquisition and/or construction of items of property, plant and equipment that were not ready for use at the end of year and these are stated at

3.07 **Inventories and Stores**

Inventories and stores are comprises of raw materials, raw materials in transit, packing materials, work in progress, finished goods, store items and spare & spare parts in transit. Inventories are valued at the lower of the cost and net realizable value.

3.08 **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and Cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, bank current accounts, other bank deposits are free of encumbrance and having maturity date of three months or less from respective dates of deposit.

3.09 Statement of Cash Flows

Statement of Cash Flows is prepared in accordance with IAS- 7, and the cash flows from the operating activities have been presented under direct method as prescribed by the Securities and Exchange Rules, 2020 and considering the provision of paragraph 19 of IAS 7 which provides that "enterprises are encouraged to report cash flows from operating activities using the direct method".

3.10 Taxation

3.10.1 Tax Holiday

The company enjoyed tax holiday for 4 (four) years commencing from 01 March 2008, under approval of National Board of Revenue (NBR) dated on September 09, 2008. The tax-holiday period of the company expired on February 29, 2012 and due provision for Income Tax has been maintained in the Statement of comprehensive income. During the tax holiday period 40% of net profit of the company is transferred to the tax holiday reserve in proportionately to invest in the areas as specified by the income Tax Ordinance 1984. Income tax provision made after expiry of tax holiday period as per rate prevailing during that period.

3.10.2 Current Tax

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the period ended, using tax rates enacted or subsequently enacted after the reporting date and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years. Provision for taxation is calculated on the basis of applicable current tax rate and compliance with Finance Act, 2023.

3.10.3 Deferred Tax

Deferred tax arises due to temporary difference deductible or taxable for the transaction which is recognized in the statement of income statement. A temporary difference between the tax base of an asset or liability and its carrying amount/or amount in the Statement of Financial Position. Deferred tax assets or liability is the year income tax recoverable or payable in future periods recognized in the current period "IAS 12: Income Taxes.

3.11 Segment Reporting

Segment reporting is not applicable for the company this year as the company does not meet the criteria required for segment reporting specified in IFRS-8. "Operating Segment" A Segment reporting is a distinguishable component of an entity that is engaged in providing products within a particular economic environment which is subject to risk and rewards that are different from those of other segments.

3.12 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized in accordance with IFRS 15 and the recognition process involves the following 5-step process:

- Identifying the contract from a customer;
- Identifying the performance obligation;
- Determining the transaction prices;
- Allocating the transaction price to the performance obligation; and
- Recognizing revenue when/as performance obligation(s) is satisfied.

In compliance with the requirements of IFRS 15, the Company recognizes revenue when control of the goods or services has been transferred to the customer and the performance obligation has been completed. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the amount of consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled to, including variable consideration, if any, to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal will not occur.





3.13 Other Income and Expenses:

Interest income is recognized on accrual basis and all other income and expenses is recognized when it is received.

3.14 **Foreign Currency Transactions**

Transactions in Foreign Currencies are translated into BDT at the rate of exchange ruling on date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities expressed in foreign currencies are translated into BDT at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Gains or losses resulting from foreign currency transactions are taken to the Statement of comprehensive income.

3.15 **Borrowing Costs/Financial Expenses**

Borrowing costs are recognized as expenses in the period in which they incurred and capitalized the same that incurred before commencement of commercial operation.

Earning Per Share (EPS) 3.16

The company presents basic and diluted (when dilution is applicable) earnings per share (EPS) for its ordinary shares. Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the profit or attributable to ordinary shareholders of the company with the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the period, adjusted for the effect of change in number of shares for bonus issue. Diluted EPS is determined by adjusting the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders and the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding, for the effects of all dilutive potential ordinary shares. However, dilution of EPS is not applicable for these financial statements as there was no dilutive potential ordinary shares during the relevant year.

Workers Profit Participation Fund (WPPF) 3.17

The company has recognized with the Labor Law 2006, amendment in 2013 and 2018 and introduced workers profit participation fund (5% of profit before charging such expenses).

Financial Instruments: 3.18

Financial assets and liabilities are recognized on the balance sheet when the company has become a party to a contractual provision of the instrument:

Accounts Receivables

Accounts Receivables are stated at their nominal value and considered good. No provision has been made for doubtful debt and no amount was written off as bad.

Accounts Payables

Accounts Payables are stated at their nominal value and no bank acceptance is provided as of the reporting date.

Due to/Due from Related Parties

Due to /due from related parties are stated at nominal value.

Borrowings/Secured Loan

Interest bearing bank loans and overdrafts are recorded at the proceeds received. Finance charges are accounted for on an accrual basis.

• Financial Risk Management:

The company has exposures to the following risks its use of financial statements:

- Credit risk
- Liquidity risk
- Market risk

The Board of Directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the company's risk management framework. The Board oversees how management monitors compliance with risk management policies and procedures, and reviews the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to risks faced by the company. The Board is assisted

oversight role by Audit Committee. Internal audit, under the purview of Audit Committee, undertakes both regular and adhoc reviews of risk management controls and procedures, the results of which are reported to the Audit Committee.

Credit Risk:

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a buyer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's receivable from customers. Sales made to the entity are fully secured by Letters of Credit issued by local scheduled banks.

Liquidity Risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will unable to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Company's reputation. In general, management ensures that it has sufficient cash and cash equivalent to meet expected operational expenses, including the servicing of financial obligation through preparation of the cash forecast, prepared based on time line of payment of the financial obligation and accordingly arrange for sufficient liquidity/fund to make the expected payment within due date. Moreover, the Company seeks to maintain short term lines of credit with scheduled commercial banks to ensure payment of obligations in the event that there is insufficient cash to make the required payment.

The requirement is determined in advance through cash flows projections and credit lines facilities with banks are negotiated accordingly.

Seeks to maintain a balance between the higher returns that might be possible with higher levels of borrowings and the advantages and security afforded by a sound capital position. The Board also monitors dividend trend to ordinary shareholders.

Market Risk:

Market Risk is the risk that changes in market prices such as foreign exchange rates and interest rates will affect the Company's income or the value of its holding of financial instruments. The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, while optimizing the return.

• Capital Risk Management:

The Company's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the Company's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns for shareholders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain an optimal capital structure to reduce the cost of capital. The Board seeks to maintain a balance between the higher returns that might be possible with higher levels of borrowings and the advantages and security afforded by a sound capital position. The Board also monitors dividend trend to ordinary shareholders.

• Money Laundering:

The company considers prevention of money laundering risk not only as a compliance requirement imposed by the law of the country but also as one of its ethical business values.

3.19 Event after the Reporting Period

In compliance with the requirements of "IAS-10: Event After the reporting period" that provide additional information about the company's position at the date of the financial position are reflected in the financial statements and events after the reporting period that are not adjusting events are disclosed by way of note.

3.20 Date of authorization:

The audited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2024 were authorized by the Board of Directors on 05 September 2024 for publication.



4.00 **Additional Information**

4.01 Responsibility for preparation and presentation of Financial Statements

The Board of Directors is responsible for the preparation and presentation of Financial Statements under Section 183 of the Companies Act, 1994 and as per the provision of "the framework for the preparation and presentation of financial statements" issued by the International Accounting Standards Committee (IASC).

4.02 Risk and uncertainties for use of estimates in preparation of financial statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the International Accounting Standards requires management to make estimates and assumption that affect the report, amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and revenue and expenses during the period reported. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates are used for accounting of certain terms such as long term contracts, provision for doubtful accounts, depreciation and amortization, employees benefit plans, taxes reserves and contingencies.

4.03 Reporting Currency and level of precision

The figures in the financial statements represent Bangladesh currency (Taka), which have been rounded off to the nearest integer.

4.04 **Going Concern**

The company has adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future. For this reason the directors continue to adopt going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

4.05 Period of Financial Statements

Period of financial statements is from 01 July 2023 to 30 June 2024

4.06 **Significant Event:**

Revenue of the company increased by 28.54% over the previous financial year due to an increase of demand of Denim fabrics in the international market also financial expenses increase by 1.76% on sales due to increases of interest rate on local and international bank & financial institute. Resultantly net profit margin after tax and EPS increased by 83.45% respectively as compared to the previous year.

Net operating Cash Flow stood at Taka 3.68 per share from Taka 6.99 in the previous year due to increase of Accounts Receivable in compare to previous year.

Court Matter:

In further development of the court matter previously mentioned, the Hon'ble Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of Bangladesh disposed of the case, directing the company to appoint a Managing Director and Deputy Managing Director by holding an Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM). Accordingly, a notice for the EGM was issued on 4 January 2024. However, the EGM was postponed due to a prohibitory Court Order. The Hon'ble Appellate Division further directed the company to issue a fresh notice for holding the EGM.

Meanwhile, a writ petition was filed by a shareholder, challenging the consent letter issued by the Ministry of Commerce under section 109 of the Companies Act, 1994, in favor of Mr. Tanvir Ahmed, allowing his managing directorship for more than two companies. The Hon'ble High Court Division issued a Rule Nisi and stayed the operation of the said consent letter for six months.

In compliance with the Hon'ble Appellate Division's Order, an Extraordinary General Meeting was held on 2 March 2024, during which the shareholders graciously consented to appoint Mr.





Tanvir Ahmed as Managing Director. However, Ms. Shehrin Salam Oishee was not elected as Deputy Managing Director.

In accordance with the Hon'ble High Court Order, in Company Matter No. 822 of 2023, passed on 14 January 2024, the company conducted its 28th AGM on 28 March 2024. During this meeting, the shareholders made the following changes to the Board structure:

- a. Ms. Shehrin Salam Oishee was not re-elected as Director, and in her position, Mr. Sunil Daulatram Daryanani, Nominee of Epic Garments Manufacturing Co. Ltd., was newly appointed.
- b. Mr. Tanvir Ahmed was re-appointed as Managing Director for the next 5 years.

Mr. Tanvir Ahmed filed a CPLA (941 of 2024) before the Hon'ble Appellate Division to stay the order of the High Court regarding Writ Petition (2481 of 2024). Upon hearing, the Court was pleased to grant the stay as prayed for eight weeks and passed an order to dispose of the Rule Nisi by 30 May 2024.

After hearing all parties, the Hon'ble High Court Division, on 19 May 2024, dismissed Writ Petition No. 2481 of 2024. According to the Order, there will be no limitations on Mr. Tanvir Ahmed serving as the Managing Director for all his companies.

The revaluation of land and land development has been done by Asian surveyors ltd considering the cut off date 10 June 2024 and signed on 26 June 2024.

Method of valuation

The valuation of land of Envoy Textiles Ltd. has been prepared on the basis of "Market Value" and values 100% of the land of the Company as on 10 June 2024. As per International Valuation Standard (IVS) framework market value is the estimated amount for which an asset should exchange on the valuation date between a willing buyer and a willing seller in an arm's length transaction, after proper marketing and where the parties had each acted knowledgeably, prudently and without compulsion in a normal situation. The valuation has been done using the basis of market value on a going concern basis which requires the determination of the market value of the assets.

The market approach for land and cost approach for buildings were done for the valuation. The valuation of the said assets was done taking these as running concerns. Valuation of land was estimated considering the market value/fair value of similar assets of similar condition, size, locality etc.

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Basis of Valuation

All the relevant information as to the current value of similar land in the locality were explored by us and other allied factors were minutely checked/considered while arriving at possible current value of the land.

Valuation Date

The valuation of the properties as on **10 June 2024** were taken into consideration.

Assumption

We have checked and examined the information supplied by the management of **Envoy Textiles Ltd.** and verified them with other related sources.

For land we have considered the market value/fair value of similar assets of similar condition, size locality etc.

Fairness Opinion

The valuation has been undertaken in accordance with International Valuation Standard (IVS). Thus, the fundamental principles of ethical conduct namely integrity, objectivity, competence, confidentiality and professional behavior have been maintained throughout the valuation and have taken all possible steps to avoid or mitigate possible threats to compliance of these principles. As the scope of work was a valuation based on market value of land only, the relevant IVS were: IVS 103: Reporting and IVS 400: Real Property Interest.

Valuation approach and methodology

Land and buildings have been valued taken into consideration the date of acquisition for land and the year of completion for buildings, as per BSEC's notification no. SEC/CMRRCD/2009-193/150/Admin: dated 18 August 2013, "two valuations of same class of assets are not allowed within the time lag less than three years and no upward valuation of any asset shall be made within two years of its acquisition." This factor was taken into consideration while determining the value. Valuation of Land was worked out on the basis of estimated market value.

For mortgaged land where the bank borrowings/facilities are availed by parties other than the Company; the Company may not be able to dispose the land whenever it wishes to. 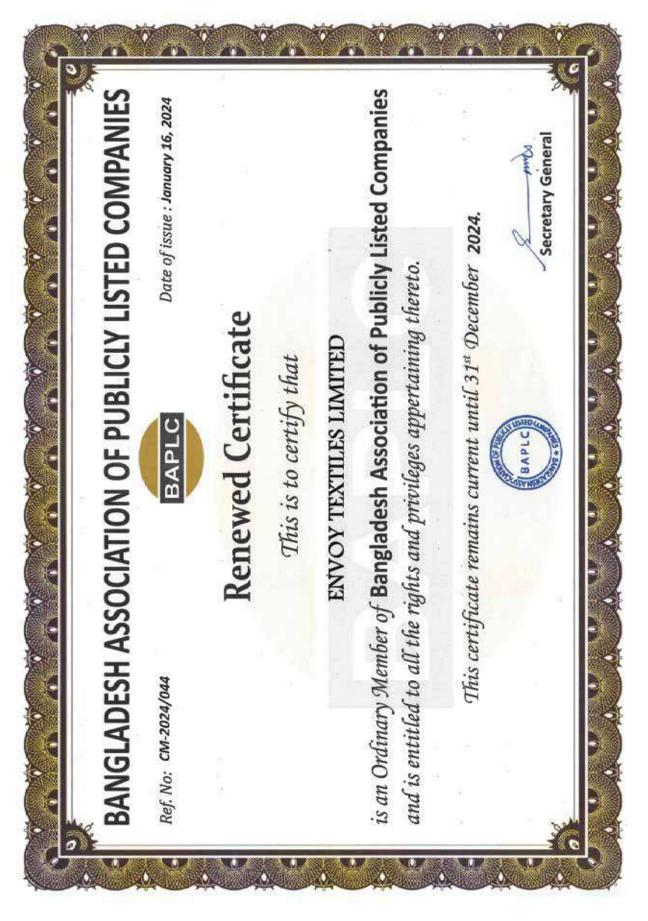
